

DEFICIENCY BILL IN HOUSE

Chairman Tawney Says Country Must Meet Big Deficit Next Year.

HE URGES UTMOST ECONOMY

Appropriations Will Exceed Revenue Hundred Millions Unless Estimates Are Cut Down Materially.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 23.—The urgent deficiency appropriation bill occupied the attention of the house today to the exclusion of all other business. A surprise was sprung when Chairman Tawney of the appropriations committee warned the members that the country was confronted with the certainty of a \$100,000,000 deficit unless the estimates for the next fiscal year should be cut down materially.

Tawney Calls Up Bill.

Chairman Tawney of the house committee on appropriations today called up the urgent deficiency appropriation bill. An agreement was reached to devote the entire day to general debate on the measure.

Decrease in Revenue Probable.

Mr. Mann (Ill.) referred to the promises of both parties that if successful at the next election they would revise the tariff, and inquired of Mr. Tawney if it was not probable that always immediately preceding a revision of the tariff there was a great decline in the custom receipts of the government?

D., Jan. 23.—(Special.)—No arrest has yet been made in connection with the death of a young boy of Ben Handsome Elk, a well-known Sioux Indian, whose home was on the Lower Brule reservation and who died as the result of being struck on the head with a club in the hands of John Dillon, a pioneer resident of Lyman county and at present a business man in the town of Kennebec, Lyman county.

Big Ranch Sale.

CHEYENNE, Wyo., Jan. 23.—(Special.)—The Colin McDougall ranch at Diamond today was sold to the Swan Land and Cattle company (Two Bays) for \$28,000.

Concert Hall Singer Murdered.

CHICAGO, Jan. 23.—Mrs. Catherine Cartwright, a concert hall singer and singer, was found shot to death in her room, 22 Wells street early today. The police are searching for James Madole in connection with the murder.

McCurdy's Expected Home.

MORRISTOWN, N. J., Jan. 23.—Mr. and Mrs. Richard H. McCurdy are expected to return today from Europe, where they were soon after the insurance investigation several years ago.

FEWER IDLE CARS IN WEST

Surplus of Trains Reduced by Regain in Traffic.

BUSINESS IS ON THE ASCENT

Reports of Continuation of Losses in the Eastern Railroad World Do Not Find Counterpart in the West.

Western railroads converging in Omaha cannot find it possible, in the face of actual facts and conditions, to join their comrades further east in a cry of "hard times." And the belief is general in the west that conditions are not as bad in the west as some sources represent them.

The surplus of cars is not as great on the Union Pacific as it was December 24, said W. D. Lincoln, car service agent of the Union Pacific, under whose jurisdiction are all the cars of the Overland route.

While eastern railroads are represented as suffering a continuation of loss in traffic, western roads are not in that condition, officials affirm. The tendency is said to be up rather than down.

The Bee published a story January 17 showing that the number of idle cars in the United States December 24, when the official report was filed, was 208,000. General Manager Holdrege of the Burlington at that time, commenting on the general situation in the railroad world, said that while the slump in the west was not as great as in the east, the Burlington's traffic had fallen off about 20 per cent as compared with a year ago.

"I think the same improved condition exists on all the Nebraska lines, as on the Union Pacific," said Mr. Lincoln. "We have been sending all foreign cars possible to their lines and this has tended to cut down the surplus. The Union Pacific has not many idle cars. The grain movement is picking up right along in both Kansas and Nebraska and there is also considerable live stock moving. Colorado is also picking up."

COTTON FIRMER ON REPORT

Census Bureau Shows Production Has Been Less for Season Now Ended.

NEW YORK, Jan. 23.—The cotton market opened firm at an advance of 11 to 15 points in response to the bullish census report indicating that only 388,000 bales had been ginned for the last period against 425,000 last year.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 23.—The census bureau today issued a report showing that the total amount of cotton in the United States ginned from the growth of 1907 to January 15 was 10,337,967 bales, as compared with 12,178,189 bales for the same period last year and 9,980,334 bales for the same period in 1906.

Frank Walters, general manager of the Northwestern said that business was picking up considerably and there was a greater demand for cars than there was a couple of weeks ago.

DAMAGES FROM WHITE CAPS

Connecticut May Seek to Recover for Injuries that He Received.

HARTFORD, Conn., Jan. 23.—The suit of Willis P. Griffin against Charles Allehouse, former deputy sheriff, and eleven other citizens of Granby, in which the plaintiff claims \$10,000 damages for alleged "white cap" assaults, is on trial in the court here today.

REGULATION, NOT TEMPERANCE

Law Enforcement Society Declares Recent Movement Does Not Mean Prohibition.

LOUISVILLE, Ky., Jan. 23.—Dr. Quincy Tully, secretary of the Law Enforcement society of New York City, addressing the Model License League convention today, said the society represented the law enforcement of all laws and especially the excise laws in New York.

PACKING HOUSES ARE ALL BUSY

Plants Running Full Force and Receipts of Live Stock Larger.

Receipts at the South Omaha stock yards are showing an increase after the slump in live stock prices cut down the shipments during the last of November and the month of December and packing houses are running full force.

PRESIDENT DEFENDS HIMSELF

He is to Issue Statement Concerning Appointments He Has Recently Made.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 23.—President Roosevelt today sent for the members of his cabinet and instructed them personally to prepare for him at their earliest convenience a list of all appointments which require the ratification by the senate which have been sent to that body during his present session.

CONSULAR AGENT INVOLVED

Extensive Revolution Conspiracy Unearthed in South.

CHARLES MIOT ONE OF SUSPECTS

Arrest of Gordiani Reveals Number of Men Who Have Been Stirring Up Trouble in Hayti.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 23.—Startling developments in the plot to overthrow the government of President Nord in Hayti have followed the investigations of the secret service agents in New York in connection with the arrest of Jose Gordiani on the charge of counterfeiting Haytian money. The officials say they have ascertained that the prisoner was the agent of a formidable conspiracy whose operations probably would have extended beyond the limits of Hayti into Santo Domingo and even into Cuba had the revolution in Hayti been a success and the agents in New York remained unmolested.

It was found among other things, the secret service operative declare, that certain persons in Hayti, mostly Frenchmen and Corsicans, and one of them a brother of the American consul agent at St. Marc, as one of the persons to whom a number had applied.

Agent at One Dismissed.

Upon learning this fact last evening the State department immediately cabled to American Minister Furness at Port Au Prince to dismiss this agent at once from the employ of the United States. This action was taken because the State department feels that it must keep itself absolutely free from the appearance of sympathy with rebellious movements in Latin-American departments.

Chief Wilkie of the Secret Service.

Chief Wilkie of the secret service, made a statement giving the facts and circumstances connected with the arrest of Gordiani which go to show that at the time of his arrest Gordiani had in his possession counterfeit Haytian paper money to the face value of \$60,000, 2,000 Remington rifles and 200,000 rounds of ammunition, all of which, it is said, was intended for the Haytian revolutionists. Six or seven months ago when this government was advised by Provisional Governor Magoun that a small party of malcontents were trying to stir up a revolution in Cuba, it was discovered that Gordiani was connected with them at that time, it developed, he had represented General Firman during the Haytian uprising in 1902, Firman then, as now, being the head of the revolutionary party.

Rifles in Store.

About that time Gordiani came to New York and ever since then the secret service of this country has had him under close surveillance. It was not long before it was discovered that Gordiani had stored in a Brooklyn warehouse sixteen cases containing 2,000 Remington rifles in fine condition. Close watch was kept on these cases and on January 4, by Gordiani's direction, they were loaded on to a truck and hauled to the Hamburg-American steamship pier, whence the steamer Graciosa was to sail on January 8 for Hayti or other West Indian ports. The cases were marked "structural iron" and the fictitious name of C. Meriam & Co. was given as the consignee, Gonzalez, Hayti, was given as the destination, the shipper's name was withheld. There were subsequently added to the consignment twenty-three barrels marked "cannon." The officials had become convinced that Gordiani was engaged in some unlawful enterprise, and the steamship company was notified not to receive the cases but "structural iron," boxes and barrels. The first contained the 2,000 Remington rifles, the barrels of ammunition, and the boxes \$500,000 in counterfeit Haytian currency.

Gordiani's arrest followed a large number of letters from General Firman and other revolutionists in Hayti and elsewhere and other papers and documents of importance.

ABSOLUTE GUARANTY BETTER

W. J. Bryan Disclaims Being Originator of Plan to Safeguard Bank Deposits.

CHICAGO, Jan. 23.—The Chicago Record-Herald today says that William Jennings Bryan is not the originator of the guaranty plan for the protection of bank deposits. In a letter to Alexander H. Revell, Mr. Bryan declares that although the scheme is spoken of as the Bryan plan, he has today disclaimed it.
