WHEAT HELD BY FARMERS Not as Much in January as During the Same Month One Year Ago.

Reports from 460 elevators located in Nebraaka, sent to the Updike Grain company, show that 21% per cent of wheat back in the farmer's hands on Jauary 18 as against 28% per cent for the same date last year. Stocks of wheat in these same elevators this year were 1,050,718 bushels, as against 1.910,343 bushels for the same date last year. These reports are from country elevators and do not include terminal stocks, which are about 25 per cent less than same time last year.
