Under this informal ruling Mr. Rossiter later in the day stepped aside and his place was taken by Captain Brian, who will adlinister the government printing office as acting public printer for the time being. Mr. Rossiter, however, does not relinquish the work of inquiry laid out for him by the president. His position in the govern ment printing office becomes that of the president's personal representative and ha s proceeding with the investigation.

It also provides that the president may in his discretion authorize and direct
