King Manuel II, projected on the throne of Portugal by assassin bullets at the age of 18, undertakes a burden that would bend stronger shoulders. The country is taxridden and impoveriahed to an astonishing degree. Portugal, exclusive of its colonies has a population of 5,400,000, who endeavor o subsist on a territorial area of 25, (9) square miles, or less than half the area of Nebraska. Forty per cent of the land is reckoned as waste and from 5,000,000 to 10,000,000 acres of cultivable land is practically unused. On top of this limited productive territory monarchy has piled a debt of \$854,000,000, requiring an annual interest charge of \$21,000,000. Fublic revenue approximates \$60,000,000 a year, a sum rarely equal to public expenditures. A high liver, a sport and junketeer, what little of his time the dead king took from royal pleasures, was devoted to devising new sources of taxation. 
