The investigation by the state college shows that very little effort is being made in most localities to exterminate the weeds, with the exception of mowing them down, but this method is not effective. It is found that there is no accepted method that is a sure cure for the worst weeds. Quack grass and some similar weeds spread by means of the roots and the plowing of them only scatters the roots and increases the number of weeds. 

Funds Being Raised to Carry Case Involving the Life of the Organization.

CLEVELAND, O., Feb. 10 .- At a meeting of the executive board of the National Window Glass Workers held last night, it was decided to fight the recent decision of Judge Phillips, in common pleas court which resulted in the dissolution of the old union, the Amalgamated Window Glass Workers of America, of which the National Window Glass Workers are the successors.

It was stated by President A. L. Faulkner that funds for the purpose of carrying the fight to the higher courts, had been donated by organized labor from all parts of the country. The fight, he said, would be waged upon the theory that the decision was a blow at organized labor. Judge Phillips dissolved the union upon the ground that the principles were in restrain of trade. The suit was begun by the Glass Cutters and Flatteners, who alleged that the union did not allow them to use machinery upon penalty of expulsion from the union, thus depriving them of an occupation.

The executive board also adopted a reso lution which will allow apprentices to fill all vacancies in flattening houses and out ting room plants operated under the supervision of the National Window Glass Workers.


