Rumor that it is Due to Supposed Slight to Prince Henry.

REPORT SURPRISE CAUSES

Dr. Hill is Considered an Able and Efficient Officer.

WASHINGTON, March 25.-The German povernment has declined to receive Dr. Darid Jayne Hill in the capacity of American ambassador to succeed Charlemagne Tower, whose resignation has been accepted to take effect upon the qualification of his successor. Dr. Hill is at present American minister to The Hague and was formerly first assistant secretary of state under the

idministration of Secretary Hay. The objection to Dr. Hill is one purely personal to Emperor William, who has simply caused it to be made known that American diplomatist is persons non grata to him. The reason for the emperor's objection is connected with the visit to America several years ago of his brother, Prince Henry, the ranking admiral of the German navy. Dr. Hill at that time was first assistant secretary of state and necessarily was brought into official contact with the distinguished foreign visitor. Just what he did or did not do to give offense is not known here.

A perplexing feature of the case is presented by the fact that last November the German government let it be known that Dr. Hill would be cordially received as American ambassador to Berlin. At that time Ambassador Tower, after the president had sought in vain to dissuade him from such a course, reached the decision that proper consideration for his own private business interests and the welfare of his children, whose education he deemed it necessary to perfect in America, obliged him to muist upon the acceptance of his

As having a possible bearing on today's developments, the fact is recalled that Dr. Hill, as a part of his literary output, was a political author of great force. During the McKinley campaign he wrote and spoke frequently, and his brochures figured extensively in the Roosevelt campaign. He was regarded as an expert on economic bjects and wrote with particular vigor and strength upon matters relating to the protective tariff, which suggests that possibly therein might be found the germ of objection now lodged against him.

David Jayne Hill for many years has been regarded as an authority on inter- in freight rates. national law. As president of Rochester university he made that subject a speclalty and he was the author of several works thereon. He entered the service of the State department October 25, 1826, as assistant secretary of state. His record in the State department was that of an extremely efficient officer and during the frequent illnesses and absence of Secretary Hay he discharged the duties of the head of the department in a manner that elicited the warm admiration of the late President McKinley, President Roosevelt also conceived a high admiration for Dr. Hill's ability, and it was with some reluctance that he yielded to the doctor's desire to go abroad. While in Washington Dr. Hill and his wife filled the mast important place in the social life of the capital.

Views in Berlin. BERLIN, March 25.-The German govern ment has informed President Roosevelt that Dr. David Jayne Hill, at present American minister at The Hague, is not acceptable to it as ambassador at Berlin. Charlemagne Tower, the present ambassader, declined today to either confirm or deny this statement; he confined himself to saying that question as to the action of the German government must be directed to the State department at Washington. From other sources R was learned that

the grounds upon which the government declines to receive Dr. Hill are in general that he is not representative enough for the United States to send to Germany. The German Foreign office made inquiries at The Hague and these brought the report that Dr. Hill has not created much of a position for himself at the Netherlands It appears also that some German officials who have met Dr. Hill have made representations at the court here adverse to him. It does not appear that any of Dr. ill's opinions or writings are objectionable To German feelings, but it would seem that he was considered as not suited for this
