Towns marked with \* have changed from the vote of last year. WEST POINT, Neb., April 8.—(Special.)—The municipal election for the city of West Point, held Tuesday, resulted as follows: For mayor, F. D. Hunter; for city clerk, C. C. Malchow; for city treasurer, R. H. Kerkow; for councilman, first ward, Joseph Jerman; second ward, W. T. S. Nellig; third ward, H. S. Rader; for members of the Board of Education, Dr. H. L. Wells and M. E. Keri. Neither the saloon question or partisan politics was an issue, the only test being the personal popularity of the candidates.

ORCHARD, Neb., April 8.—(Special.)—At the village election held here yesterday the members of the old board, who were running for re-election on a no-license ticket, were elected by safe majorities, this being the first municipal election an entire board was elected.

LINDSAY, Neb., April 8.—(Special.)—At the village election the entire people's party ticket was elected, no issues being at stake. A large vote for the population was cast. The following trustees were elected: M. Y. Bamaekers, William Brozorsky, N. M. Nelson, Dr. J. H. Tobkin and George Van Askens.

WYVON, Neb., April 8.—(Special.)—The special election for water bonds and the regular election of officers brought out the largest vote in the history of the place. Though the anti fought stubbornly the bonds carried by a close margin, 71 to 21.

SELGIN, Neb., April 8.—(Special.)—The no license ticket was elected here by one vote. This is the first time for years that the question has been before the people and the election was hotly contested. A full vote was polled.

PLATTSMOUTH, Neb., April 8.—(Special.)—A light vote was polled here Tuesday, there being no "dry" ticket in the field. W. L. Pickett, republican, was elected mayor over John Lutz, the democratic nominee, by a large majority. Emmons Richey, republican, was elected city clerk and Dr. E. W. Cook, republican, was elected city treasurer. The aldermen elected were: First ward, H. J. Schlutz, republican; second ward, William Weber, republican; third ward, F. H. Gampster, republican; fourth ward, Frank Newman, by petition; fifth ward, William Mendenhall, democrat. Morgan and Cummins, democrats, were re-elected members of the Board of Education. The present democratic mayor and city clerk were elected two years ago and their terms expire this spring. It is intimated that quo warranto proceedings may be commenced in order to jar the local board of officers, as the clerk refused to have the names of the regular nominees of the two parties for those offices printed on the ballots, but that did not prevent the citizens from writing the names on the ballots and voting. The names written on the ballots in the Fourth ward were not counted, but proceedings in the supreme court may compel them to be counted.

BYANNS, Neb., April 8.—(Special.)—The village election here resulted as follows: For saloon 12, against 23; for water works, 22, against 11. Two anti-license trustees were elected to the board, which was formerly "wet." The board is now divided equally on the license question.

FAIRMONT, Neb., April 8.—(Special.)—The election passed off quietly yesterday. The citizens or license party elected one councilman for the second ward and the no license councilman for the first ward was elected. There being two no license party holding over, this gives the no license party an absolute majority on the board for the next year. The vote on mayor was equally divided, which will be decided in the usual way in such cases.

HEBRON, Neb., April 8.—(Special.)—The complete "dry" ticket was elected here Tuesday. Mayor Rhodes being re-elected by five majority. The bonds for the erection of a new grammar school building did not come up.

HARVARD, Neb., April 8.—(Special.)—The election yesterday was a very quiet affair, as only one ticket was before the voters, the city high license ticket being elected without any opposition, with only a partial vote being cast. The vote on the \$15,000 school bonds for the erection of another building close to present one on same lots, was also carried by a large majority. Ecleston; third ward, Thomas Slack; fourth ward, Herman Schomaker.

MILD ROASTING FOR JURORS

Governor Objects to Having Them Shift Responsibility On to Him.

MUST ASK TO LAY OFF TRAINS

Railway Commission Issues Order to Companies in Matter of Discontinuation of Train Service.

(From a Staff Correspondent.)

LINCOLN, April 8.—(Special.)—Jurors who convict an accused person and then sign a petition for his pardon may expect little consideration at the hands of the governor. This was the message given to the jurors by the governor yesterday.

The governor plainly set out in the hearing granted on the application of Dr. W. A. Cate of Nelson, sentenced to serve eighteen months in the penitentiary for cutting Lee Greese while the two were fighting. Seven of the jurors signed the petition for clemency and none refused to sign. While Mrs. Cate was addressing the executive on the petition, Governor Sheldon interrupted her to remark that he was asking him to do what the jury had refused to do.

"The jurors who signed the petition, after they voted to convict Dr. Cate and send him to the penitentiary, certainly should explain their action. If they thought him innocent they should have voted to free him. Their conduct needs explanation."
