ASPHALT PAVING IS LATE

Some Due Last October Will Not Start for Weeks.

BRICK WORK IS DONE FIRST

Much of the Former Will Not Be Completed Until Late in the Fall, Says the City Engineer.

All brick paving, where contracts have been let ought to be finished within a month, says the city engineer, but will not be done until late in the fall.

Three paving contracts, held by Charles E. Fanning, have already been completed this year, all of them being brick.

High Murphy also holds a number of other paving contracts which he has not yet been begun, but which he expects to get at within a few weeks.

West Farnam Work Late. The paving on West Farnam was to have been completed October 31, 1907, says Assistant Engineer Crick.

"The fall of the year is the best time for paving, the weather is more settled then, but I believe that the contractors expect to rush the work this year and have the streets in good shape early in the summer," says the assistant engineer.

BIDS FOR ARMY SUPPLIES

Proposals for Fuel at Various Posts in Department of the Missouri.

Bids were opened Wednesday morning at the office of Major D. E. McCarthy, chief quartermaster of the Department of the Missouri, for the annual supplies of wood, coal and charcoal for the various posts of the department for the fiscal year beginning July 1.

Bidders were opened at the same time and place for the same military posts for the supplies of oats, bran, hay and straw for the quarter beginning July 1, 1908, and ending September 30, 1908.

The bids will be sent to Washington for approval by the quartermaster general of the army before the final contracts are granted.

This is the heaviest call for supplies of fuel and forage in the Department of the Missouri since its creation thirty years ago.
