Mr. Boutell stated that the letters had been turned over to experts and he then called David N. Carvaino to the stand.
Testimony of Experts.

Mr. Carvalho said he had examined the two letters in question, one received by the Washington correspondent of the Detroit Free Press and the other by Frank Edinborough, state senator from Michigan, and now a candidate for congress against Mr. Loud. He also had examined a great many of the typewritten documents and compared them with the anonymous letters, taking photographs and preparing charts showing his deductions.

Unquestionably, he said, the two anonymous letters and certain of the papers were written by one and the same machine. These documents, it has been testified, were dictated by former Senator Thurston and written by Almer E. Neff on a typewriter in the Washington office of the Lake Tor pedo Boat company. The documents in quesion were questions and statements pre sented to the committee by Mr. Lilley and signed by him.

The witness said that the identity of the typewriting machines on which two or more papers were written could be determined more readily than the genuineness

of handwriting. "I know absolutely nothing as to the authorship of the anonymous letters that have been introduced in the investigation of the Eelectric Boat company," said Representative George L. Lilley, under whose esolution the investigation is being conducted, to a representative of the Association ated Press today, while David Carvalho the handwriting expert was testifying. "The four documents which Mr. Carvalho says were written on the same typewriter as were the anonymous letters, were submitted to me by an agent of the Lake Torpedo company. I signed them and submitted them to the committee. They were not written on any typewriter belonging te
