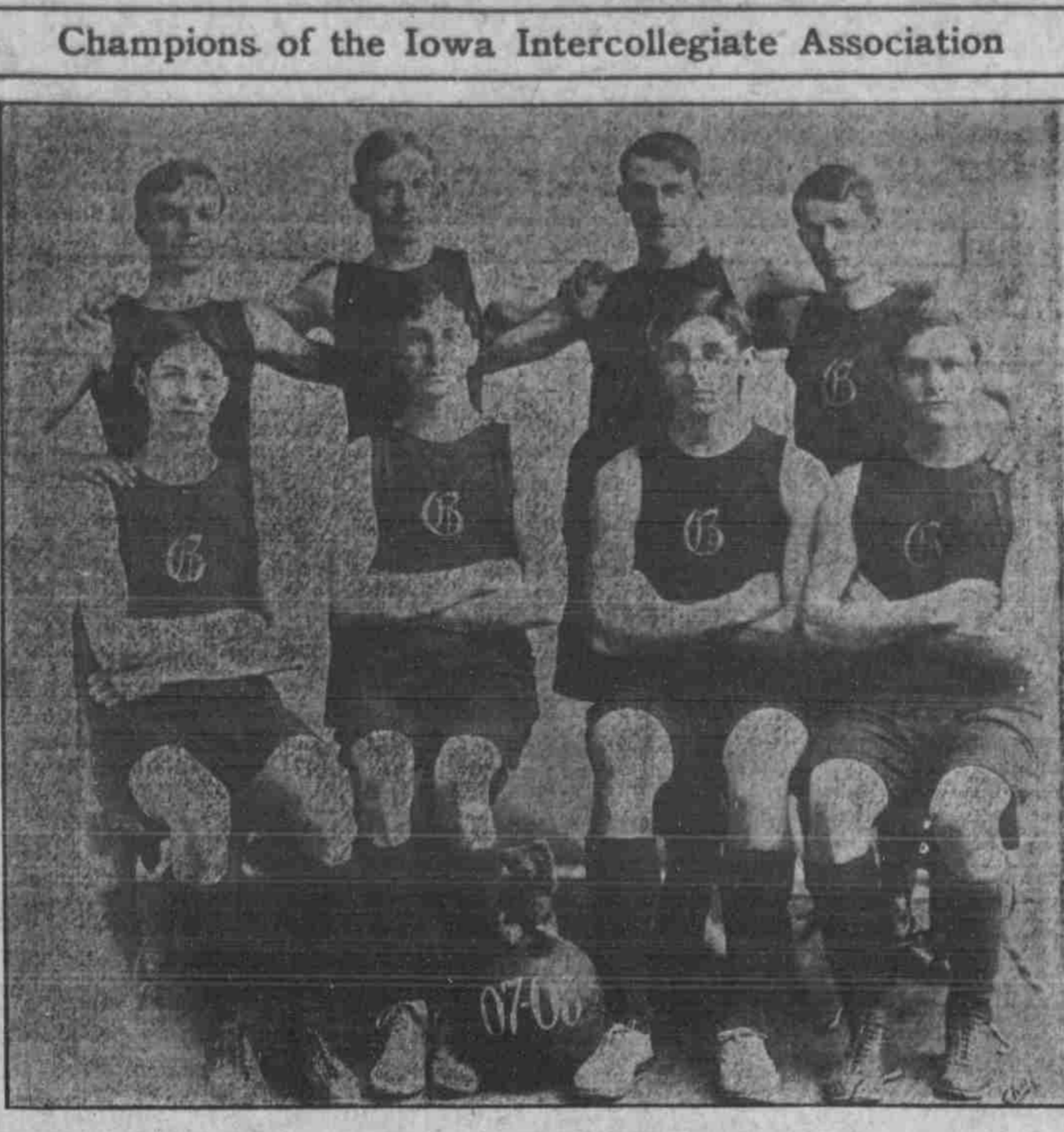

The United States was brought into quarantine and will be towed to the city for repairs. Passengers were taken off the steamer today and will be forwarded to their destination in Europe by a steamer sailing tomorrow.
