SEARCH FOR INSANE PAUPERS Investigation of Nebraska Hospitals

Ordered by Bureau of Immigration. Under the instructions of the bureau of immigration Special Inspector Samuel A. Eppler of Washington has begun the inspection of the various hospitals and infirmaries of this district with a view to ascertaining whether any insane alien paupers are domiciled therein. This is his second inspection of the Omaha district. having recently made an inspection of the state insane asylums at Lincoln and Norfolk. Inspecter Eppler's district embraces

the state of Nebraska. He has also the territory of northern Kansas and has recently completed his inspection of that district. W. R. Mansfield, the local inspector for Omaha, has been assigned a similar duty in North and South Dakota and is now engaged in that work. The purpose of the inspection is to ascertain whether there are any subjects in these institutions subject to the deportation laws. He will submit his reports to Washington before any further action is taken on the matter of deportation.

MONEY TO PAVE STREETS Three Hundred and Seventy-Five Thousand Dollars, Proceeds of Bids, Arrives.

Money for the paving of street intersections, for the construction of sewers and fire engine houses and for general street improvements is now available. City Treasurer Furay on Thursday received from R. L.
