

GRAIN AND PRODUCE MARKET

Grain Values Advance, Due to High Cables and Good Demand.

FAVORABLE CROP REPORTS COME

Growing Grain in the Very Best of Condition, Say Advisers from the Country—Features of the Day.

OMAHA, April 23, 1908. Higher cables and good demand caused another advance in grain values.

Wheat values are advanced, and the profit taking on the high points. The situation in all sections remains unchanged and the bulk factors continue to control optional futures.

Wheat opened firm and higher from the start off, and was followed by an additional advance later owing to the strength shown abroad and good domestic demand.

Corn showed some advance with the strength in wheat. There was no corn for sale at the opening, but the advance was not later on lack of demand.

May corn opened at 92c and closed at 91c. Primary wheat receipts were 240,000 bushels and shipments were 400,000 bushels.

Corn receipts were 451,000 bushels and shipments were 30,000 bushels, against 1,000,000 bushels last year.

Clearances were 10,000 bushels of corn, 10,000 bushels of wheat and four equal to 10,000 bushels.

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NEW YORK STOCKS AND BONDS

Prices of Securities Undergo a Comprehensive Uplift.

ALL OFFERINGS ARE ABSORBED

Closing Prices Are the Highest, with Some Heavy Buying in Progress—Road Market is Firm.

NEW YORK, April 23.—Prices of stocks underwent a comprehensive uplift today.

The movement showed a certain sobriety in the railroad category, but without impressiveness, viewed in connection with the steadiness and persistence of the advance.

The Pennsylvania bond issue was the main topic of consideration and the rest of the market followed its lead.

The favorable interpretation placed on the transaction, however, qualifying considerations had to do with the price which the railroad company is obliged to accept.

It developed today that the price of the bonds are offered at subscription, and the deduction to be made for bankers' compensation are understood to bring the price realized to the par value.

The premium over the allotment price immediately established in the outside market was 17 1/2c, a reflection of the confidence in the issue.

The selection of a first mortgage bond to effect the financing was a significant feature of the transaction.

Traders were awaiting the result of the London early trading range from New York, which was a decline.

FIGHT ON BREWERY SALOONS

Indiana Attorney General Will File Suits Against Big Companies in State.

INDIANAPOLIS, Ind., April 23.—Attorney General James Bingham, attorney general, will within the next ten days file suits against the twenty or more brewing companies in the state, which have, as still in operation, been operating saloons and in other ways transacting a retail liquor business.

This action, also, if entirely successful, will put out of business more than 2,500 saloons, which it is asserted, out of the 4,000 saloons of the state, are lawfully owned.
