RASTUS FREE WITH TITLES BUILDING AND LOAN ELECTS. Negro with Noble Dutch Name is Visible in Expressions of Gratitude on Discharge. Omaha Association Celebrates the Twenty-Fifth Anniversary of Its Career. At the annual election Wednesday of three members of the directors of the Omaha Loan and Building association, combined with the twenty-fifth anniversary of the association, George W. Loomis, W. S. Wright and W. Scott King were re-elected for a term of three years. The other six directors hold over and the entire board will elect the officers of the association, the old officers being scheduled for re-election as follows: George W. Loomis, president; Elmer E. Bryson, vice president; George M. Nattinger, secretary and W. R. Adair assistant secretary. A comparative statement of the condition of the Omaha Loan and Building association at the close of business April 30, last, shows its total assets as being \$1,875,828.11, as against \$1,546,821.14 on April 30, 1907, and \$1,414,560.96 April 30, 1906. The association has 36,812 shares outstanding, 6,999 of these being issued during the first four months of 1908.

Acting Governor Saunders, Mother and Sister Incorporate an Investment Company. Acting Governor Charles L. Saunders is one of the incorporators of the Saunders Investment company, a \$200,000 corporation, which filed its articles with the county clerk Wednesday. 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TAX FROM KOUNTZE HEIRS

Inheritance Fee on Million or More Securities Held by Court to Be Payable. Judge Estelle Wednesday morning decided the Herman Kountze heirs would have to pay inheritance tax on between \$1,000,000 and \$1,500,000 worth of bonds and securities which Mr. Kountze transferred to his brother, Augustus F. Kountze, in trust. The transfer was made with the understanding the property was to be held in trust until the death of Herman Kountze, when it was to be distributed equally among his children and the widow.

SUIT BY MAN RUINED BY TRAIN

Seventy Thousand Dollars Damages Asked from Burlington Under Fellow Servant Law. The trial of the case of Raymond Green for \$70,000 damages and interest against the Chicago, Burlington & Quincy Railroad company was begun in the United States circuit court before a jury Wednesday morning. The plaintiff was a switchman employed by the railroad company at Ashland and was run over by a freight train in the switching yards at that place August 1, 1907, while employed in the yards. Both legs were so badly mangled that they had to be amputated, and he suffered other injuries, resulting in his becoming a helpless cripple and epileptic. The suit is brought under the fellow servant, common and employer's liability law.

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
