AIRSHIP FLIES THIRTY MILES Wright Brothers' Aeroplane Makes Successful Trip, Carrying Two Men.

NORFOLK, Va., May 9.-The Wright prothers, acronauts, who are experimenting with their aeroplane at Kill Devil hill, near Manteo, N. C., made their third successful flight today, covering thirty odd miles and ascending to a considerable height. The absolute control of the machine shown by the aeronauts was the feature of the experiment. 
