

RINGS FOUND ON BODY

Doubt Thrown on Theory that Mrs. Guinness is Dead.

STATEMENT OF DR. GRAY

Three Circles on Right Hand of Body Found in Debris.

CAUSE OF DEATH IS MYSTERY

Mining Operations Resumed Under Direction of the Sheriff.

HOW MURDERS WERE COMMITTED

Two Dozen Pairs of Scissors Shaped Like Surgical Instruments Are Found in Ruble of Home—More Men Missing.

LA PORTE, Ind., May 12.—Unexplainable evidence which has hitherto been suppressed was made public in the Guinness tragedy today. It is contained in the report of Dr. J. Louis Gray, who performed the autopsy on the body which the authorities have steadfastly claimed is that of Mrs. Belle Guinness. Dr. Gray in his report tells of three rings which were found upon the corpse and also reveals the fact that the right hand, hitherto declared missing, is still in existence. The rings, which might be expected to reveal the identity of the wearer, only add to the mystery of the case. Two of them contain inscriptions, one being "F. S. J. S. August 12 '97" and the other "F. G. J. S. 18-97."

Mrs. Guinness' husband was Peter Guinness, but the identity of "F. S." and "F. G." is a puzzle which none of the local officials would attempt to explain this morning. Some claim it is suggested, may have been the owner of the rings, but the wife of the circles taken in connection with the date and the fact that she was born in 1897 preclude this as a definite conclusion. Dr. Gray made his disclosure in the official report which is handed to Coroner Mack this morning and refused to discuss the matter.

Discloses Rings as Evidence. The report says: With the body, but disconnected, was an adult right arm, buried and shrouded in gauze containing on the inside of the hand a band ring with small diamonds set in it. An adult hand on the left side of the forearm of the right hand, about one-third of the forearm of the right hand, was found with a small diamond set with engraving "F. S. J. S. August 12 '97" and "F. G. J. S. 18-97." (Exhibit No. 2, 3 and 4.)

Dr. Gray also discloses the presence of stockings and night robes found with the four bodies. One of the night robes was that of an adult, the length of the inside seam being seventeen inches. The gown was trimmed with lace and ribbon and its total length, according to the records of the sheriff, is thirty-one inches. It is a child's night dress and several undergarments were also found.

BALTIMORE, Md., May 12.—The work of the committee was aided materially today by the number of resolutions and memorials which continue to be offered daily at the general conference of the Methodist Episcopal church here. An important memorial, which went to the committee on episcopacy proposed that hereafter an election to the office of bishop shall be for a term of twelve years only, without re-election. After the acceptance of the bishop's term it is provided that he shall become an effective member of the conference from which he was elected.

WARSHIPS TO BE PATHFINDERS

Maine and Alabama to Leave Fleet and Prepare Way for Others.

SAN FRANCISCO, May 12.—Already a break has been made in the four lines of warships on the bay. With the departure of the Maine for Mare Island and the sailing of the Missouri to Hunter Point the first gap was made in the line of battleships. The Atlantic fleet, with torpedo boats and destroyers got under way and proceeded to Mare Island for repairs. Yesterday it was learned that the Maine and the Alabama, which are to be detached from the Atlantic fleet here, are to make the voyage to New York by the way of the Horn canal. There are many delays to be arranged in each part for the crossing of the great fleet and the Maine and Alabama will act as pathfinders for the other fourteen to which have been added the Nebraska and the Wisconsin.
