UNION PACIFIC'S DIVIDENDS E. H. Harriman Says the Company Will Pay Them.

THE TIME OF AUTHORIZING BONDS This Will Depend Largely Upon Market Conditions — Twenty-Five Millions More Baggage with Road.

NEW YORK, May 13.—Before the meeting of directors of the Union and Southern Pacific Railroad companies today, E. H. Harriman said he would recommend the declaration of regular dividends. Mr. Harriman said it was not probable that any communication regarding the new financing plan will be made today. The time of offering the bonds authorized, he said, will depend largely upon market conditions. The regular dividend of 34 per cent quarterly on Union Pacific common stock of 14 per cent quarterly on Southern Pacific common and of 24 per cent semi-annually on Southern Pacific preferred stock was declared by the directors of those companies today. "What is \$2,000,000 to the Union Pacific?" The time of offering the bonds authorized, he said, will depend largely upon market conditions. GALLAGHER CHILDREN ARE SAFE Report of Their Drowning Proves to Be False.

A report of a second case of drowning was brought to the South Omaha police station last evening about 10 o'clock, but proved to be erroneous. This report stated that two children, a son and a daughter of Mrs. Gallagher, living in S. B. county, were drowned in the same washout, where Martin Tighe and his oldest son met their death. A driver at Moshier's barn had a message written by the neighbors whom he declared had found the bodies, and he was sent to Mrs. Gallagher, living in South Omaha. Mrs. Gallagher's children were not injured.

The storm in South Omaha was very severe and hail fell in quantities to cause some damage. Three hundred window panes in the Henderson business were broken. Some of the stones were an inch and one-half in diameter. A bolt of lightning struck the steeple of the First Presbyterian church, shattering it. Another struck the house of Officer Joe Ballew in Albright. The intersection of Twentieth and N streets was badly damaged. The same is reported from several other intersections.

HEAVY DAMAGE AT NEMAHIA Three Brick Business Buildings Blown Down and One Man Injured.

AUBURN, Neb., May 12.—(Special Telegram.)—The storm which swept over the eastern portion of Nemaha county this evening blew down two brick store buildings and a brick bank building in Nemaha, twelve miles southeast of here and damaged a number of other buildings. J. N. Cooper is reported seriously injured. Damage to farm buildings, orchards and live stock is probably heavy. HERMAN, Neb., May 12.—(Special.)—A very heavy hail visited this vicinity this afternoon, hail as large as a hen's egg falling for about fifteen minutes, followed by a rain of about one inch. The hail seems to be little damage done except to window panes, several of them being broken in the depot.

Wires Suffer Badly.

Telegraph and telephone wires were badly damaged during the storm. Communication was cut off between Omaha and all the nearby towns so seriously stricken and it was impossible to get connection until late Wednesday. The street-railway, whose line between Bellevue and Fort Crook, was out of service for a few hours, did heroic work in re-establishing service, having cars running by early Wednesday morning. Trains had their difficulties, though none entering Omaha met with serious results.

Scores of Narrow Escapes.

The story of casualties is succinctly told in the accompanying table. But this story is deficient in one of the thrilling features of its subject. It could not depict the scores of narrow escapes from death and serious injury. It does not, either, suggest the devastating sweep of the storm. A party of five Italian laborers engaged on railroad work about six miles below Council Bluffs at Island Park saw the storm approaching from Bellevue and ran for shelter. The storm overtook them, but fortunately none of the men was seriously injured, though all received more or less slight injuries.

Story of Bellevue College.

Bellevue college, though seriously injured, found cause for congratulation and thanksgiving in the fact that its property losses were covered by insurance and not a student or member of the faculty was injured. The property loss to Clarke and Lowell halls, the president's residence and other territories, not one of which escaped some damage, was placed at about \$10,000, and it is offset by \$20,000, so distributed over the various buildings as to cover each one. This is regarded a remarkable in the extreme. The insurance was held by Creigh, Haldrige & Co. Joseph Haldrige said he thought the insurance would entirely cover the losses.

President Wadsworth Talks.

"It is a remarkable thing that no students were injured in all this wreckage," said Dr. Wadsworth. "With all our students and most of them in these buildings which you

Words of praise were heard on all sides for the splendid nerve and coolness shown by the college girls during the storm. They went to the basement of their halls and listened to counsel, although some wanted to go into the open. Had they listened to the counsel they would have been caught in the debris from Clarke hall and many probably would have been hurt.

When the Storm Came Up.

Chester Jenks and several of the students went onto the hill west of the college to watch the storm as it was passing over Fort Crook. The storm swerved and came in their direction, but they escaped injury by lying flat on the ground. From their position they could see the roofs being torn from the buildings at Fort Crook and also saw several houses to the west blown to pieces.

Old Structures Stand.

The old Bellevue court house, which was the first capital of the state of Nebraska, still stands, although right in the wake of the storm. It is built of stone and brick and has stood since the early '30's, being the meeting place of the first territorial legislature. In the old city hall yard, the building where the first territorial legislature met, the bottom part of the trees were intact, but the top of the huge cottonwoods were cut off as though trimmed.
