Damage to the amount of several thoueand dollars was done by the storm of Tuesday evening in Omaha, public work such as street improvement, paving and sewer construction suffering the most. Mud was washed onto the pavements in low places in great quantities, families living in the hollows suffered considerably from the overflowing of sewers and one sewer burst, causing much damage in the On Twentieth street from Poppleton ave-

nue to the railroad bridge the mud is estimated to be on the average of two feet tance of about three blocks. On Thirteenth street for the distance of about four blocks south from Jones the mud covers the pavement about one foot thick and this is the condition for the distance of a couple of blocks south from Leavenworth on Fourteenth street.

"I estimate that the cost of removing the mud from the pavements will be close to, if not quite, \$5,000," says Thomas J. Flyna, street commissioner. "The storm was one of the worst I ever saw and I doubt if such quantities of mud were ever before washed onto the pavements in this city. I put my entire force at work the first thing in the morning carting off this mud, but it will take some time to clean it all away, as it is so deep in some places that one wagonload will not clean a space as large as the wagon itself."

Charles E. Fanning, paving contractor, estimates his loss as the result of the storm at \$300 and figures that other paving contractors have suffered to the extent of about \$1,000 altogether. Fanning had paving on Thirtieth street between Chicago and California streets under way, but the rain washed out the concrete and caved in the curbing, so that work will have to be begun practically at the beginning. This is the case on Hickory street between Twenty-sixth and Twenty-eighth streets, where Hugh Murphy has the paying contract, and on Forty-first street between Davenport and Cuming streets, where
