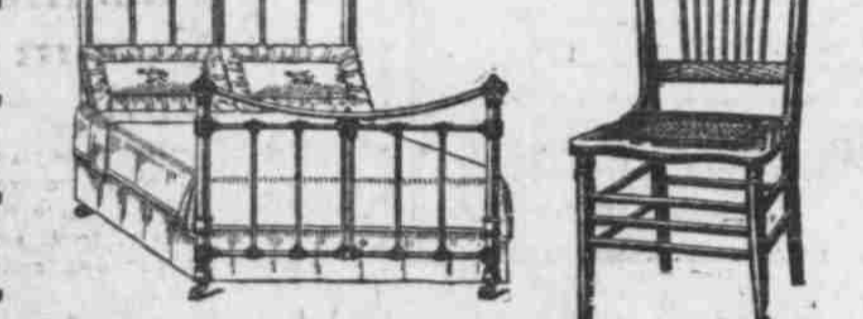

SMALL SHEEP MEN IN LINE

They, as Well as Large Shippers, Will Patronize Omaha.

BANKS WILL LOAN ON WOOL HERE

C. H. King Wires that He Has Loaded Two More Cars at Sheepland and Billed Them for Omaha.

Small wool growers, as well as large shippers, are getting in touch with the Omaha Wool and Storage company. Friday the secretary of the company received word from a farmer at Cook, Neb., who said that he had three sacks of wool, and another grower said his output would be 20 pounds and wanted to know if there was being made to handle this small business and the growers will be given the top of the market at all times.

A railroad official received the following letter from a sheep man in the Big Horn Basin country, showing that that section of Wyoming is waking up to the advantages of the Omaha wool market. He also said he was ready to ship his wool to Omaha as soon as arrangements could be made. He wrote:

If Omaha can store and sell wool it will be a big thing for Omaha merchants. You know what the wool growers have spent in Billings at sales during the last year. I know there were ten men from the Big Horn country who sold in Billings last year, and not one of them spent less than \$50 each in expenses and supplies. It seems to me that wool sales in Omaha conducted as they should be, would be worth to Omaha merchants \$1,000,000 worth of business they do not get now (annually). I have received letters from the First National, United States National, Omaha Merchants National banks of Omaha telling me they would make loans against wool stored in Omaha, so it looks as if the financial end was going to be all right.

This is taken as showing that the banks are not only willing to loan money on wool, but are going after the business. It also shows to what extent the Omaha merchants may expect to be benefited by the new wool market, which will bring the growers and of Wyoming and the entire west to Omaha. C. H. King, president of the Omaha Wool and Storage company wired Friday morning that he had loaded two cars of

wool at Sheepland, and that the wool would soon be started for Omaha. J. A. Detlefer, vice president of the company, has already shipped 200,000 pounds of wool from his own sheep, and that will soon be enroute to Omaha.

The large force of workmen at the new warehouse will be kept at work Saturday and Sunday and it is now expected that most of the roof will be on the huge structure by Monday night.

EMERSON MAN DENIES NOTE

In Reply to Suit Nicholas Liewer Says He Never Executed Such a Promise.

Nicholas Liewer, a farmer of Emerson, Dixon county, has filed his answer to a suit brought against him in the United States circuit court to recover on a note for \$2.00. The suit is brought by the First National bank of Shenandoah, Ia. The present owner of the note, which came to the bank through James J. Doty, manager of the Wonder Stock Powder company of Iowa.

In his answer Mr. Liewer says he never executed such a note, nor did he ever authorize the execution of such a note. The transaction, Mr. Liewer alleges, grew out of his being persuaded to buy 300 pounds of so-called stock food, in September, 1907, from one W. E. Lewis, alleged to represent the Wonder Stock Powder company, and that he was to pay but 5 cents per pound for the stuff. Mr. Liewer states further in his answer that the word "bonded" has been inserted in the document after the words "twenty-four." The note has been such blurred and blotted and is alleged to be partly illegible. He states also that the First National bank of Shenandoah is not the real party at interest in this cause and that there is no consideration named or pretended in the transfer of the note to the bank.

The alleged note is claimed to have become due January 1, 1908.

PACKER SUED FOR COAL BILL

Omaha Company Defendant in Case Brought by Sheridan Company on Contract.

The Sheridan Coal company has brought suit with the packing company to deliver coal to it in quantities of not less than ninety tons per day and that such delivery was made during the months of April and May, 1908, and for some reason the defendants decline to pay. Suit is therefore brought to recover on the contract, with interest.
