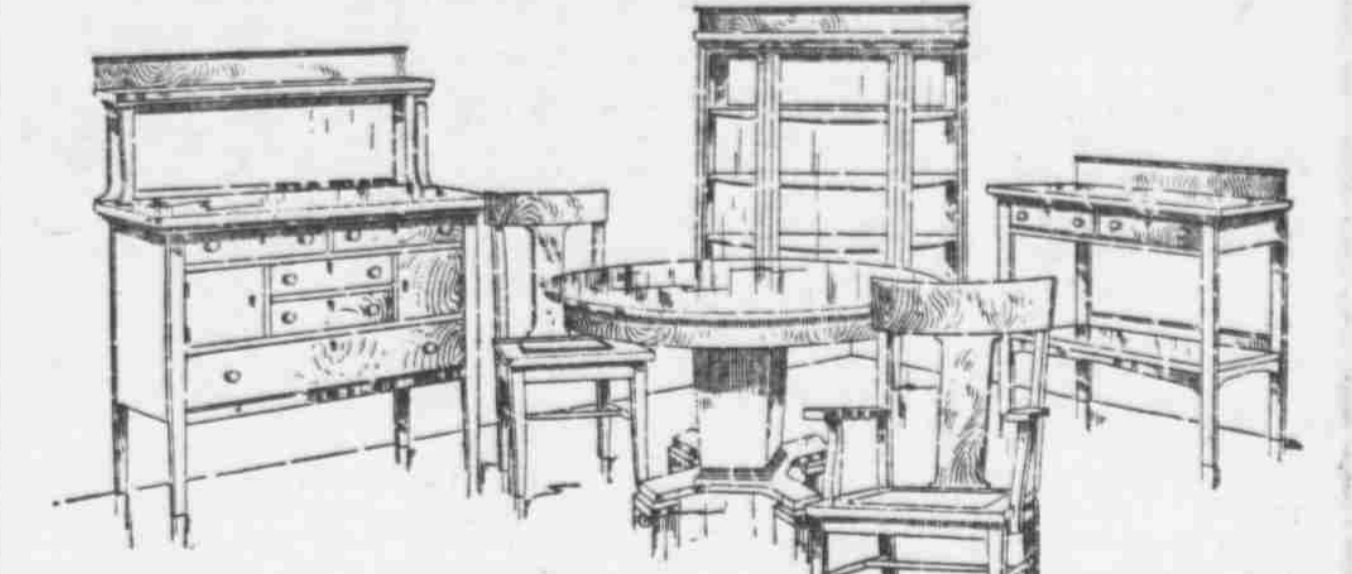
PREMONT—The Fremont drainage district is having considerable trouble in placing the head of the big dam, which is west of the head of the big island, which the new work went out again yesterday.
