CONDITIONS OF OMAHA TRADE

Month and Last Year. GOOD CHANCE FOR JUNE GAIN

May Close with Increase Over Last

Jobbers are Gratified at the Showing Made in all Lines of Business, Inside and in the Country.

May jobbing business in Omaha closed big and gives good reason to lock for a large gain for the first aix months of the fiscal year ending June M. There is avery reason to believe that the steady progress made during May will be continued and even increased during June. The volume of trade for May is a great improvement over that of April and larger than for May, 1907. And this affords the utmost satisfaction is the wholesalers, who might without criticism, have suspected some decline in receipts. But instead of a decline, an increase of gratifying proportions has come both in house and field trade.

The country merchants send in gratifying reports indicating that trade outside continues to advance. Jebbers have been wastly encouraged to look for larger things by the results of the week's trade excursion in the west. The enlarged receipts of grain during the week have added significance to the importance of Omaha, the Market town. Bank clearings have shown a material gain, building operations have gone forward with steady step, the popularity and development of the wool lodustry has contributed vasily to the general stability of conditions.

Boots and Shees.

Trade has been fairly good, but still it might have been better. The facts are that there has been to much rain. Rubbers have gone out freely for immediate delivery, but country dealers have been a little slow in ordering the general line.

Drugs. With the drug trade May is closing in good shape. There has been a general deciline in prices on most of the lines. Lineard oil, however, continues firm and active. Dealers arthurous about buying extensively. Morphine is off 10 cents an ounce, while gum campbor is up 5 cents.

The recent rains have started a beavy movement in spouting. Galvanised iron tube are off 10 per cent; while wooden tube are up 5 per cent. Garden hose is setting freely. Generally all lines are firm. May business has been excellent, much bet-Groceries.

Trede has been good during the last week and prices are firm on most lines. October cheese is out of the market. Other stocks are easy. Canned goods are a problem just now. Packers of corn have advanced their prices, claiming that the rains have delayed the planting and at the same time decreased the acreage. Early tomato plants have either been frozen out or washed out and consequently futures have been put up 1970ac above the prices of ten days ago. The California fruit outlook is good on everything but pruces, which have been hadly damaged by cold and wet. Bugars are firm, with raws slightly higher for June delivery, indications now are that it is not going to be so much a question of price as a question of retting the sugar. This is due to the prospects of a fruit crop which grows more encouraging each day.

Produce. The market is steady on all lines. Texas tomatoes are coming in large quantities and the quality is sood. Missouri berries are on the market and have become plentiful and cheap, being of fine quality. New potatoes are much cheaper.

Butter, Eggs and Poultry. Creamery butter is up from last week, being quoted at Me for the best Cream is coming in great quantites, the prices paid being 18679c. Eggs and poultry are selling at the same prices of one week ago.

Canned Goods. Demand for canned goods is better than last week. Consumers are taking more fruits and vegetables and fish, and this makes the movement more active. Prices are generally unchanged on spot goods and futures. Tomatoes and corn, however look a little firmer on account of the very bad reports concerning the cropa, which are not only backward, but delayed to an important extent.
