track men, J. W. Davis and Miss Leonard. One of the purposes of the gathering was to stimulate an Ames spirit. A central permanent organization was perfected, and it is the purpose of the students to organize county associations and to carry to the homes of the people the college spirit.

The record for the year shows an attendance of nearly 1,700 students during actual college work. Between 20,000 and 40,000 young people graduate from Iowa high schools annually. The Ames spirit intends to teach that there are enough young people prepared for college in Iowa alone to give to every college all of the students it can instruct under existing conditions.

In the meeting was emphasized the fact that the college is in great need of a thoroughly modern up-to-date gymnasium and also a women's building. It is believed that the next general assembly will be urged to make appropriations for one or both of these buildings at its next session.

German-American Teachers. The annual convention of the National German-American Teachers' association will be held at Milwaukee, June 26, to July 2. A number of papers of special interest are included in an extended program. A new feature of the convention will be an exhibition of means of instruction, text books and other publications related to the teaching of modern languages.

Michigan University, Ann Arbor. Within the last year the total of student registrations at the University of Michigan has passed the 5,000 mark. The calendar of the University of Michigan which has appeared shows a total registration of 4,000 students in the seven departments and the 1907 summer school session. This number exceeds that for the year 1906-07 by 284.

Foreign countries and American possessions are represented at Michigan as follows: Porto Rico, six; Philippine Islands, five; Hawaiian Islands, four; Canada, twenty-three; Mexico, eight; Japan, six; China, six; Netherlands, four; Germany, Turkey, and Russia, each three; India, Bulgaria, West India, each two; Colombia, England, New Zealand, Burmah, Chili, Brazil, Persia, Panama, and Cuba, each one.

The number of university officers, including the teaching force and the administration staff, as shown by the university calendar, is 412 for this year. The officers are distributed as follows: Professors, eighty-three; junior professors, twenty-eight; assistant professors, thirty-nine; three-year instructors, eight; one-year instructors, ninety-three; assistants, seventy-eight; administration officers, 116, of whom forty-two are also on the teaching force.

It is announced in the calendar that the academic year for this university shall hereafter extend from the Tuesday preceding the first Tuesday in October to the last Tuesday in June. By a change in the Christmas vacation this adds an extra week to the school year.

The observance of the memorial hall at the university will be laid on alumni day, June 11, during commencement week. When completed this building will be one of the most imposing structures on the university campus; it will cost about \$75,000. Of this amount about \$25,000 has been subscribed by the alumni, to which sum the regents have added \$50,000.

The university senate has passed a resolution of death on pipe and bowl, the Sophomore Convivial club, and expelled two students for franks following the club's initiation of freshmen on Saturday night, May 31. John Van Brunt of Kansas City and Thomas Wandy of Grand Rapids were arrested early Sunday morning while in possession of a red lantern that ought to have been taken down warning drivers away from a look in the pavement. They were fined \$50. Justice Dooly, held before the faculty, they said their stunt with the lantern was part of an initiation program. Their suspension for one year, with the loss of this semester's credit, was decreed. President Angell then issued an order for the immediate dissolution of Pipe and Bowl.

Iowa University. A new and rather drastic social regulation adopted at the State University of Iowa requires that after the opening of the next school year, the students may give and attend parties only on Friday and Saturday evenings, and the evening preceding a holiday. The purpose of this rule is to discourage certain few who are inclined to give up many of their evenings to social amusements. Owing to the small number of halls which are available for dancing purposes at Iowa City, this rule will necessarily diminish the number of parties next year.

Until recently there has been few restrictions which refer to the social life at the university. Owing to the growth of the university, society has grown to such an extent that rules with reference to hours and chaperons have been found necessary.

As History Might Be Taught. "One way of teaching history which the schools might adopt," says the Boston Transcript, "has apparently not yet appeared to school managers. A good newspaper, if the teacher knows how to interpret it daily record, may stimulate an interest in history even more than the formal history text. If the pupil can be taught the continuity and relation of events, an awakened interest in daily happenings will arouse a desire to trace them back through preceding stages. It is the break in continuity between the past and the immediate present that deadens enthusiasm. By studying history backward from the immediate present the chain would be bridged and the past tracing effect to cause stimulated."

One Thousand Woodmen of the World Will Be Initiated Today at Auditorium.

Competitive work by state deputies for the Woodmen of the World will bring into the Omaha hall throughout the entire United States, is being centered in the coming head camp meeting to be held in Peoria during the week of June 4. Initiations now held by its being the greatest meeting ever held by that organization. Many questions of importance are to come before the meeting for settlement and the debates are bound to be most interesting. The members of the society in Peoria are leaving no stone unturned to properly entertain the thousands of visitors that will enter the gates of that city during the week. Among the important measures to be considered at this meeting is the establishment of a great tuberculosis sanatorium at Colorado Springs, where sufferers from the great White Plague can receive proper treatment. The society has purchased an ideal thousand acre tract, and the members have voluntarily contributed over \$25,000 in cash, with which to purchase the land and provide necessary buildings. It is believed this will be the largest and best tuberculosis sanatorium in the world.
