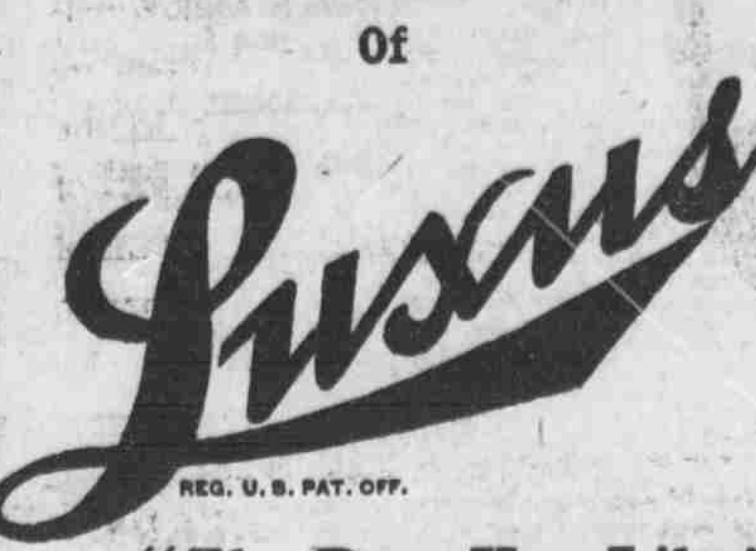

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END OF PRATT CASE IS NEAR

Taking of Testimony Probably Will Be Closed This Morning. DOCTOR AND LAWYER TESTIFY

Secretary Said to Be Administration Candidate for Vice President. WASHINGTON, June 9.—Indications are multiplying that Secretary Cortelyou will be advanced by the Roosevelt and Taft forces at Chicago as their candidate for vice president. Secretary Cortelyou himself naturally declines to discuss the matter of his candidacy, for the reason that his native state already has in the field a possible candidate for the presidency in the person of Governor Hughes. That fact has so far operated to prevent any open exchange between the friends of Secretary Cortelyou and Secretary Taft's managers. But it can be stated as a fact that in the opinion of his friends the time has come when Secretary Cortelyou should be placed in a position to be recognized as New York's candidate for the vice presidency in the event of the elimination of Hughes from the presidential race. As a necessary step to a successful campaign in that direction there had first to be ascertained the attitude that President Roosevelt and Secretary Taft would assume toward Secretary Cortelyou's candidacy. The secretary himself has declined to make any move in the matter, but his friends have not been restrained by that fact and already they feel that they have received such encouragement that they are now preparing to move in force upon the convention delegates at Chicago. One reason for their confidence is asserted to be the belief that by the strenuous opposition offered by the Fairbanks contingent to the recognition of southern Taft delegates in the battle before the national committee now in progress, the coupling of the names of Taft and Fairbanks or of Roosevelt and Fairbanks on one ticket has become impossible. Therefore, tomorrow, Secretary Cortelyou's advance guard starts for Chicago, led by Assistant Secretary Louis Coolidge, a Bostonian of long experience in public affairs and of wide acquaintance with the various boom managers now in Chicago. Cornelius N. Ellis, one time member of McKinley's cabinet and treasurer of the last republican campaign committee, is also said to be bound for Chicago in Secretary Cortelyou's interest, while among other political leaders expected to espouse his cause is said to be Senator Murray Crane of Massachusetts, whose support is most anxiously desired by the administration force.

GUIDE'S NAME TO BE PRESENTED

Senator Lodge Will Place Governor in Nomination. WASHINGTON, June 9.—It has been determined by the friends of Governor Curtis Guild of Massachusetts that his name shall be presented to the Chicago convention as a candidate for vice president.

Senator Lodge of Massachusetts, who is to be permanent chairman of the convention, will leave the chair during the proceedings to present to the convention the candidacy of Governor Guild. The nomination, it has been arranged, will be made by Charles E. Osborne of Sault Ste. Marie, Mich.

CHICAGO, June 9.—The first headquarters for candidates for vice president were opened today at the Auditorium Annex for John Hayes Hammond of New York. They were in charge of John C. Montgomery of New York.

Mr. Montgomery declared that Mr. Hammond will arrive in Chicago late this week or on Monday. A telegram was received today from J. G. Hett, the national committeeman from Alaska, saying that he would not attend the convention and asking that his proxy be continued in the possession of Arthur F. Statter, who has held it since the first sitting of the national committee.

Governor Guild arrived in Washington today. He is expected to visit at this time was to attend to some pressing private business. Incidentally, of course, his visit had some political significance, but Governor Guild is inclined to depreciate such discussion of that.

"The fact is," said he, smilingly, "the only real political advantage which I see in a desire on my part to dispel an illusion that has been hovering about like a ghost next autumn in behalf of the republican party."

"Some discussion has appeared in the newspapers concerning my candidacy, such it can be termed—for the nomination for vice president. As I have said all along, I am merely in a receptive mood. My name probably will be presented to the convention, but I am not in Washington for the purpose of promoting my political interests. I have not discussed the matter with Secretary Taft and do not expect to."

Governor Guild took luncheon with President Roosevelt at the White House. Late this afternoon, accompanied by his brother, Governor Guild left for Boston. He will not attend the national convention, regarding it as improper under the circumstances for him to do so.

Speaker of House Says End is Not Yet in Sight. CHICAGO, June 9.—Joseph G. Cannon, speaker of the house of representatives, arrived in Chicago today from his home in Danville, Ill., and declared himself a candidate for president of the United States "until they stop voting or elect someone else."

"I am here on business," said the speaker, "I just ran up from Danville this morning and will return home tonight. I am not here to open headquarters—the boys are doing that for me. I have never so far down there, nor will I visit any other place where the boys are mixing in."

Mr. Cannon declared that in his opinion it was not the proper thing for a candidate for the presidency of the United States "to mix in personally," but "leave that sort of trouble for the boys."

When told of the fact that Frank H. Hitchcock was no longer acting as assistant secretary for the national committee he remarked: "Well, if he was removed, the people doing things probably knew what they were doing, but as to that I am not fully acquainted."

When asked if he was in the race to "stick" he sat upright in his chair and snapped, "Stick! Why, man, I can't do anything else but stick. The state of Illinois is behind me, and that is enough to make a man do almost anything. Stick, well I should say so."

Mr. Cannon was cheerful as to the outlook, declaring in conclusion: "The end is not yet by a long shot." Senator Charles Dick of Ohio, announcing himself as a Foraker man, first, last and all the time, arrived here today. He will probably appear before the national committee in the interest of some of the Foraker contesting delegations from the south. He declined to express an opinion as to the situation, saying that he has been in Chicago too short a time.

DEATH RECORD.

David G. Crippen. HOT SPRINGS, S. D., June 9.—(Special.)—Captain David G. Crippen, late of Company D, Eighth New York heavy artillery, died yesterday morning after lingering nearly five weeks after being stricken with a stroke of paralysis. He had been a resident of the state since 1881 and the county since 1880. He had served as county commissioner since 1897, most of the time being chairman. He was postmaster at Kimball, S. D., for seven years and was the first hospital steward of the State Soldiers' Home here in 1891. He was a prominent Odd Fellow of over thirty years and Mason, which lodges will have charge of the funeral tomorrow.

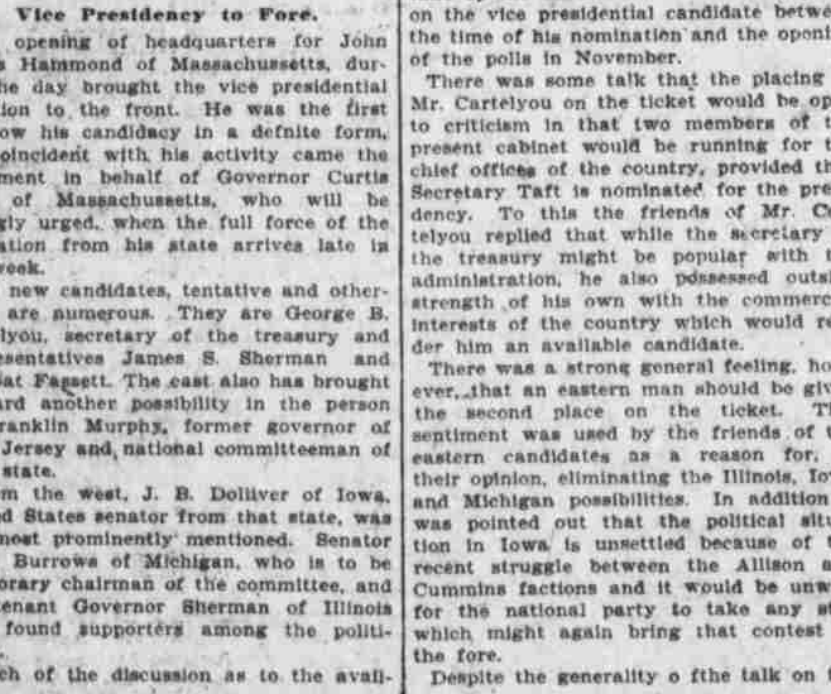
