

CANNON IS IN RACE TO "STICK" Speaker of House Says End is Not Yet

by Good Deal. CHICAGO, June 9 .- Joseph G. Cannon, speaker of the house of representatives, arrived in Chicago today from his home in Danville, Ill., and declared himself a candidate for president of the United States, until they stop voting or elect someone

"I am here on business," said the speaker 'I just ran up from Danville this morning and will return home tonight. -I am not here to open, headquarters-the boys are doing that for me. I won't even go down there, nor will I visit any other place where the boys are mixing in."

Mr. Cannon declared that in his opinion was not the proper thing for a candidate for the presidency of the United States "to mix in personally," but "leave that sort of trouble for the boys."






DEATH RECORD.
