SUIT AGAINST NEW ROAD

Stockholder Wants Receiver for Omaha-Hastings Line.

ATTACKS OFFICERS OF CONCERN

Declares They Are Violating Themselves Salaries, Expense Money and Commission and Not Building Railroad.

Suit for an accounting of and a receiver for the Omaha & Nebraska Central railway, a concern which has attracted the aid of large number of small investors in the building of an electric line from Omaha to Hastings.

The officers of the company are arraigned in drastic terms in the bill, and they are charged with voting themselves large sums of money for salary and expense.

Vote Themselves Salaries.

It is also charged officers have been voting themselves salaries of \$150 a month and large sums for the year.

The petition attacked the financial statement of the company, which represents its assets to be \$175,538.42 and its liabilities to be \$23,800.12.

CASH SHY FOR THE DASH

Bunch of Money Needed to Start Peary Off for the North Pole.

Confident of his victory to carry the stars and stripes to the north pole, Commander Robert E. Peary, who is now in Casca Bay, Maine, for a few days, has made preparations for another arctic dash.

Peary's present plans contemplate his departure from New York about July 1, but lack of sufficient funds to finance the expedition may prevent the start.

Peary has devoted nearly twenty years in efforts to solve the great problems of the north and already has put into the work all of his personal means amounting to \$3,000.

Peary is hopeful that the comparatively small sum necessary to complete the exploration fund may be raised in time to permit him to carry out his plans.

The total number aboard on leaving here will probably be twenty, the same as formerly. Charles Peary, my steward, on two previous voyages, will go again.

As will also Matthew Henson, my colored assistant. My surgeon is yet to be selected. I shall take aboard from twenty to twenty-five of the most effective Eskimo hunters by their wives and children, which will make the Eskimo contingent going north from the Whale sound region from forty to fifty. I shall require from 200 to 250 dogs.
