

GRAIN AND PRODUCE MARKET

Grain Values Have Weakening Tendency and Market is Dull.

WHEAT AND CORN BOTH WEAK

July Wheat Closed at 82 1-2 and Corn Closed at 67 3-4 Cents and Liverpool Cables Close Lower on Market.

OMAHA, June 20, 1908. Grain values have a weakening tendency, with the market generally dull and buyers held off by values gradually sagging lower.

Wheat opened steady, but soon became featureless and prices sagged off with cables lower and a lack of demand from buyers to sustain values in the close.

July wheat closed at 82 1-2 and corn closed at 67 3-4 cents. Primary wheat receipts were 38,000 bushels and shipments 48,000 bushels.

Corn receipts were 35,000 bushels and shipments 1,000,000 bushels. Clearances were none of corn, 5,000 bushels of oats and wheat and flour equal to 17,000 bushels.

Liverpool closed 1/4 cent lower on wheat and 1/2 cent lower on corn. Local grain market articles open, high, low, close, year.

CHICAGO GRAIN AND PROVISIONS. Feature of the Trading and Closing Prices on Board of Trade.

CHICAGO, June 20.—Ideal weather conditions southwest and northwest were chiefly responsible for an easy tone in the local wheat market today.

A selling movement headed by a leading local trader, under a pressure on what values which was irresistible and the downward trend of prices was not checked until the decline had gone far enough to induce moderate support from shorts.

There was a quiet, but firm market for corn, July opened 1/4 cent higher, at 67 3/4 and declined to 67 1/4.

There was a fair trade in oats and the market was quiet, but firm. September opened 1/4 cent lower to 46 1/4.

Provisions were quiet. Light offerings and a 1/2 cent advance in hogs resulted in a better market throughout the day.

Estimated receipts for Monday: Wheat, 30 cars; corn, 25 cars; oats, 15 cars; hogs, 400 head.
