SUMMER SCHOOL OF ETHICS.

Sessions in Connection with University of Wisconsin. The American Ethical union will hold its innual sessions in connection with the summer school of the University of Wiscousin, at Madison, beginning July & Heretofore, the school has had three departments-ethics, history of religion and political economy. The directors of these departments have been Profs. Felix Adler of New York, C. H. Toy of Harvard and H. C. Adams of Michigan. Its faculty of ecturers has included the most eminen ninkers and leaders of the day, and has entributed much toward conscious construction efforts in the solution of the most vital problems confronting American ivilization. Clergymen, teachers, social workers, have attended its sessions in large numbers. The movement has rendered valuable service to the school, the Sunday chool, to social institutions and the church. This year's meeting in Madison will con-

ne its lecture curriculum to the problems general and special moral training, and the ethical movement. The broader and ore extended lecture courses in general ducation, philosophy, ethics, economy sociology, political science, and history may be taken in the university summer session. The university courses will be formal and systematic, after the usual university method. The school of ethics courses will onsist of single lectures and series of five or six lectures by a large and varied fac ulty of lecturers. 
