WHAT CLUB WOMEN ARE DOING. General Federation May Begin Anti-Divorce Legislation Agitation.

The resolutions on divorce presented by the out-of-town committee of the General Federation of Women's clubs to the Boston division promise to afford a definite working basis for the women on this much agitated reform.

Miss Harriet Lake of Iowa, chairman of the committee, provides that persons contemplating marriage shall be required to register their intentions at least a year before they are allowed to marry.

This the women would make a legal formality just as the securing of a marriage license is. Miss Lake argued that the great majority of divorces are the result of hasty marriages and that if people were required to wait a year after becoming engaged, the divorce problem would practically be solved.

Of course, the committee advocates uniformity in the observance of such a law and if the federation takes up the agitation of this movement the work will be carried on by state committees and state legislation will be asked by every federation.

This is the plan by which the women have accomplished so much in the way of reform legislation. They are not blind to the many evils that might result from this year's enforced delay in marriage, but they contend that they can be no greater than those resulting from the present system.

The divorce problem was first taken up in the National at St. Louis in 1904, when a resolution condemning it was passed and consistent with this action the convention also eliminated from its roll of honorary presidents a former president of the General Federation who had been married a short time before a divorce was granted. Repeatedly in the past divorced women of superior ability have come out as candidates for offices in the General Federation, but regardless of services they might have rendered or their qualifications for the offices sought they have, with scarcely an exception, been put aside by a majority so significant that few so defeated have ever come before the convention in this way a second time.
