#### GRAIN ALLOWANCE UNLAWFUL Fees Paid by Union Pacific to Peavey Knocked Out for Two Yours.

WASHINGTON, July 9 .- On the ground that the allowance is unlawful the Interstate Commerce commission today ordered the Union Pacific Railroad company to desist for two years from paying any allowhe has an ungovernable temper and has since to Peavey & Co. on their own grain received into any of their elevators at Kansas City and Council Bluffs or on grain thus received in which they have any direct and indirect ownership or interest, and thirty-one suits have been filed in dis- that is not reshipped out of the elevators within ten days of its receipt. The order prohibits allowance to the Peavey company on grain that has been mixed, treated, weighed or inspected in any of their elevators at those cities.

> Grain interests of Omaha will be unaffected by the ruling of the Interstate Commerce commission in the Peavy-Union Pacific case, according to a number of grain dealers. The Peavey company and the Transmississippi Grain company will both lose the three-quarters of a cent per hundred pounds elevation charge now being paid them by the Union Pacific railroad company on their own grain shipped to the plants at Council Bluffs. But the outgoing roads will continue to pay the elevation allowance, which will make up to the companies now receiving it from the Union Pacific practically all they will lose by it. "It simply means that the elevation charge will not be paid by incoming roads. but by outgoing roads," said a grain dealer. "No other roads are raying the allowance on incoming grain and there is no reason why the Union Pacific should pay it to the

Omaha Elevator company." E. P. Peck, vice president and general manager of the Omaha Elevator company, said he would not discuss the decision as reported by the Associated Press, but would reserve his remarks until he could read the entire decision.
