Second baseman fields the ball, steps on second base and in attempting to complete a double play, starts to throw the ball to first, but the runner, who is forced out, knocks the ball out of the second baseman's hands. The umpire calls both men out, the man who hit the ball as

both men out, the man who hit the ball as well as the runner, who was on first and who knocked the ball from the second baseman's hands. Is this correct?

Auswer-You do not specify whether the Answer—You do not specify whether the runner purposely or accidentally interfered with the ball. It is a play that depends much on circumstances and which is not specifically covered by the rules, though the latter half of section 7 of rule 56, under the caption, "When Runners Are Out," might apply to it. It says: "In case the fielder be occupying a base runner's proper path in attempting to field a batted ball, then the base runner shall run out of direct line to the next base and behind said fielder and shall not be declared out for ters, is send sire.

fielder and shall not be declared out for doing so."
Section 8 of the same rule says: "If he fail to avoid a fielder in attempting to field a batted ball, or in any other way obstruct a fielder in attempting to field a batted ball, or intentionally interfere with a thrown ball." (the runner is out). The custom generally is to call the runner who has just hit the badl out also where the interference is intentional. CAPTAIN KELLER GOES TO PEN Urbane Forger Who Fleeced Some

Omahans Gets Two Years at Leavenworth. Captain Daniel F. Keller, formerly of the

United States army, has been sentenced by United States district Judge Landis at Chicago to two years in the military prison at Fort Leavenworth for forgery. Captain Keller entered the arm

as a recruit in the Eighth cavairy. He rose from the ranks and was commissioned a second lieutenant in the Twentyfourth infantry in July 1898 and in 1896 was made a first licutenant and assigned to the Thirtieth infantry. He was subsequently promoted to the rank of captain. While he was attached to the Thirtieth infantry, the captain became acquainted with a number of Omaha people, though he was not stationed at Omaha. He later profited by this acquaintance and succreded in having a number of Omaha people cash fraudulent checks for him to he amount of about \$700. Captain Keller was next heard from in Goldfield and Reno, Nev., and his Omaha friends set steps afoot to find and arrest him. His victims were John L. Kennedy, Stockton Heth and Frank Hamilton, and one or two of the Omaha hotels. Finding his capture difficult the Omaha

victims of Captain Keller abandoned the search. The next heard of the wily captain was in San Francisco, where he was pursuing the same tactics and later Le was found to be carrying on similar practices in Chicago, where it was ascertained that he had secured some blank quartermaster's checks, and being an export penman as well as an urbane society man, spread them about pretty freely. He again appeared at Reno, Nev., where his capture was almost effected and finally he was brought to bay at Kamloopa, B. C., where he made an unsuccessful attempt to pass more bad checks.

Captain Keller was an extremely hand some man and bore his milltary carriage with the greatest dignity and suavity and was petted and feted in Omaha in the highest of social circles.
