Sultan of Turkey Yields to Demands and Grants Constitution.

OLD LAW IS MADE EFFECTIVE

Election of Chamber is Ordered Under Statute of 1876.

GRAND VIZIER ACTS PROMPTLY

Circular Containing the Trade Sent to All Provinces.

SENSATION IN CONSTANTINOPLE

Substantial Granting of Practically All Demands of Young Turks

CONSTANTINOPLE, July 24.—An imperial decree issued this morning ordains the assembling of a chamber of deputies in accordance with a constitution which has been elaborated by the sultan.

The constitution which the trade now makes effective in practically the one worked out in 1876. The grand vizier immediately took steps to carry out the orders of his imperial master.

Change Due to Revolt

It was felt that in view of the general result in the army, unprecedented in the history of the empire, the sultan's position was inevitable and that far-reaching measures of reform in the central government were bound to be inaugurated.

THREE KILLED, FIFTY HURT

Lightning Causes Panic in National Guard Camp at Gettysburg.

WILD NIGHT ON BATTLEGROUND

Governor Stuart's Tent Blown Down and State Officials Have Narrow Escape—Women and Children in Hysterics.

GETTYSBURG, Pa., July 24.—An all night search throughout Camp Hayes, where the 10,000 men of the National Guard of Pennsylvania have been in camp for weeks, and which was late tonight visited by a terrific electrical and wind storm, shows that three soldiers were struck dead by lightning and that nearly a half hundred other persons were injured by the electrical bolts or were otherwise hurt.

Private Clyde Morrison, Company D, Sixthteenth regiment, Oil City, Pa. The dead were members of the Second brigade, composed of regiments from the western part of the state, most of the storm damage occurring in the section of the field occupied by that brigade.

Governor's Tent Blown Down.

The tent which Governor Stuart had been occupying during the week's encampment was blown down by the terrific wind and the governor and those who were his guests at the time were buried under the canvas.

Three Killed in Different Places.

The three guardsmen who lost their lives were killed in different places. Barbe was sitting in his tent with another soldier, when he was enveloped in a blue flame, following a terrific crash, and he fell dead.

Garber was with friends in the guard tent when he was killed.

The bolt struck him in the head, severely shocking all of them. Then it shot along the ground thirty feet to the tent of Chief Musician Morrison, wrecking the tent and stunning Morrison, Christian and their wives. It tore Christian's coat to shreds and twisted his alto horn into a shapeless mass.

Steel Puttees Attract Lightning.

In each case of those killed, the new army puttees, furnished just before the men went into camp, were torn from their feet, the steel rib being exposed. Some of the officers believe the steel attracted the lightning.

Women in Hysterics.

The trolley line between the camp ground and the town was put out of service by the storm and many of the visitors were compelled to visit the streets by the Young Men's Christian association tent.

ITALIANS LEAVE IN FLOCKS

House at Natchitoches Dynamited and Sheriff Makes Request for Troops.

NATALANY, La., July 24.—Following the dynamiting of an Italian home here this morning and other disorders, Sheriff Seal of the parish of Tangipahoa, shortly before noon today, sent a message to Governor Sanders asking for troops. No one was injured in the explosion. Italians by the hundreds have been leaving this section, seeking refuge generally in New Orleans, where the Italian consul is giving the matter his attention.

NEBRASKA AT CONFERENCE

Only State West of Missouri to Be Represented at Chicago Republican Meeting.

Responding to a request from Frank H. Hitchcock, chairman of the national republican committee, William Hayward, chairman of Nebraska committee and Victor Rosewater, national committeeman from Nebraska, will attend the conference of republican leaders of the middle west states in Chicago today. Nebraska will be the only state west of the Missouri river represented at this conference. Mr. Hayward will be accompanied by Mr. Rosewater, and Mr. Rosewater by a later train.

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
