

Vicinity. The payroll of the mills, furnaces, coke Score: plants and coal mines of the various companies clearing through Pittsburg banks was the largest yesterday of any pay day since last October. The increase, while gradual and steady, is not phenominal, yet every business man is satisfied that it is drawing nearer to the figures tailied last year during the most prosperous months. For instance, the payroll at the National Tube works, McKeesport, where 6,500 men are now employed, amounted to almost \$250,000 for the last two weeks.

The payroll at the Homestead Steel works of the Carnegic Steel company is within 10 per cent of what it was last summer. That of the Edgar Thompson and Duquesne Steel works is only 5 per cent of last year. The Pittsburg Steel company, however, has almost as large a force at work as it ever

The pay of the H. C. Frick Coke company and that of the independent coking oncerns has increased 50 per cent within the last three months from what it was during the winter, and it is predicted that by September it will be increased fully 30 per cent more. The coal mining companies of this district, the largest of the world, are paying within 80 per cent of the wages paid any time in the coal industry existence, which means that fully \$60,000 a day is being expended in wages for coal mining from Pittsburg banks alone. This does not include the vast operations in West Virginia, especially at Fairmont, which are alive with activity, nor the Jefferson Clearfield county fields, nor those of Cambria and Indiana or Westmoreland countles, which ship their produts to tidewater. During the boom in 1897, Pittsburg's payrolls amounted to \$1,000,000 a day, not in-

cluding that made up in the smaller towns. Although the railroads are not doing their share of business, their payroll is now alturing plants are not active, but their wage expenditures do not affect the average invested in labor to such an extent as conerns that employ thousands of men. The Colonial Steel company signed the scale of puddlers, scrappers and other skilled men, and the plant at Monaco, Pa., which has been idle the last eleven months, will begin work tomorrow with more than 500 men .-Pittsburg Dispatch.
