SILKS ARE TO BE HIGHER

Manufacturers Unable to Produce New Stuffs at the Present Prices.

The purchaser of silks for fall and winter wear stands every chance of being compelled to pay some sharp advances on fashionable colors and fabrics. In order to make the new goods at the prices the manufacturer is being compelled to pay higher prices for raw silk. The new silk fabrics being all on the soft, clinging order, require more silk to be used in making them up, and as raw silk is now selling at from \$1.25 to \$1.60 per pound for the best grades, manufacturers cannot long afford to sell the goods at the prices that are now in force. Stripes and border silks will be seen in all of the latest fall costumes, and tailored suits are the thing for street wear, as well as dressy occasions. For evening wear soft, clinging effects will be favored, such as chiffon silks, crepe de chine, and silk velvets in the new reality patterns that are now being turned out for the coming season. Silk wraps and coats will be worn to a greater extent than last fall, and will be made up from peau de soie, satin, heavy soft satin finished silks, and to some extent, from brocade silks.
