

Features of a Late Commencement and Reunion.

The Wayne normal closed the most successful year of its history Friday, with the reunion and banquet of nearly 300 members of the alumni. Chapel talks, class reunions, basket ball, base ball and tennis furnished a day of enjoyment, which closed with an excellent 6 o'clock banquet under the direction of Mrs. Pile. The commencement exercises began July 21 and continued through eight days with strong programs, which were enjoyed by a crowded chapel each evening. Thursday evening Congressman G. E. Norris of McCook delivered the graduating address to an enthusiastic house. His address was of a high order and was pronounced one of the ablest ever heard in the chapel. This year has been the banner one for the school in attendance as well as in the work done. Diplomas and state certificates were issued to eighty-eight members of the teachers' and scientific departments; twenty-five diplomas to the commercial department, and one to the music department. The attendance at the summer session, which opened June 25, reached 260, most of whom were teachers and those preparing to teach. County Superintendents Tved of Ponca, Miller of Hastings, Perdue of Madison and Pitzer of Pierce assisted the regular faculty during the summer. The new school year will open August 21, with four additional members to the present faculty, all of whom remain. The new courses—agriculture and manual training—are fully organized and are proving very popular.

Prof. and Mrs. C. H. Wright, former teachers in the school, have returned from a three-year stay in the Philippines and take a place in the faculty.

President J. M. Pile has recovered from his illness and has been able to be at his office a short time each day for a week.

HIGHLAND PARK COLLEGE.

Satisfactory Progress in the Past and Plans for the Future.

The Highland Park college commencement occurred during the last week of July. Highland Park college is in session forty-eight weeks during each school year, consequently the commencement exercises occur later than in most colleges. The following facts were given out by President Longwell at the close of the year during the commencement season: Number of students enrolled for the college year, 2,384; number of states represented, 36, and the District of Columbia; five foreign countries were represented. Students were present from 99 of the 99 counties of Iowa. The number of graduates was 28, the graduates representing 13 states.

During the school year the college installed a complete system of sewerage for all the college plant, nine buildings in all, at an expense of about \$4,000. During the year a new biological laboratory was established and fully equipped, said to be the most complete biological laboratory in Iowa. Also a new physical laboratory was installed and equipped, which is as complete as any to be found in the state. This completes the full complement of laboratories at Highland Park college, making as complete a system of laboratories as can be found in any school in the west—comprising chemical, assaying, pharmaceutical, biological, physical and electrical laboratories. In addition to these the college maintains the most completely equipped machine shops to be found in connection with any engineering school in the United States. The investments in buildings and grounds made up from \$2,000 to \$5,000. There are over sixty members in the college faculty, all graduates of the leading colleges and universities of the United States. The last year was the most

UNIVERSITY OF OMAHA.

Plans for Development of the Institution on Broad Lines.

Much has been said recently about the development of the educational institution at Bellevue, Neb. It is now the purpose of the board of trustees to make it in reality what it is in name—the University of Omaha. At present it offers four courses—collegiate, academic, normal and conservatory. Under the direction of H. H. Magnard, D. D., who is considered to be one of the most successful college financiers in America, a campaign to raise \$200,000 for the securing of a site at Omaha and the erection of buildings on it for technical schools has already begun. The possibilities are that the plant at Bellevue, Neb., which is a main easy access of the city by street railway, will be maintained as a junior college where the freshmen and sophomore classes will be retained, while the upper classes—junior and senior—will be provided for in a new building on the university square at Omaha. The Omaha office of the university is in the Paxton block, corner Sixteenth and Farnam streets.

Many improvements are being made at Bellevue; the grounds and buildings are much more attractive than ever before, and the faculty is being strengthened very

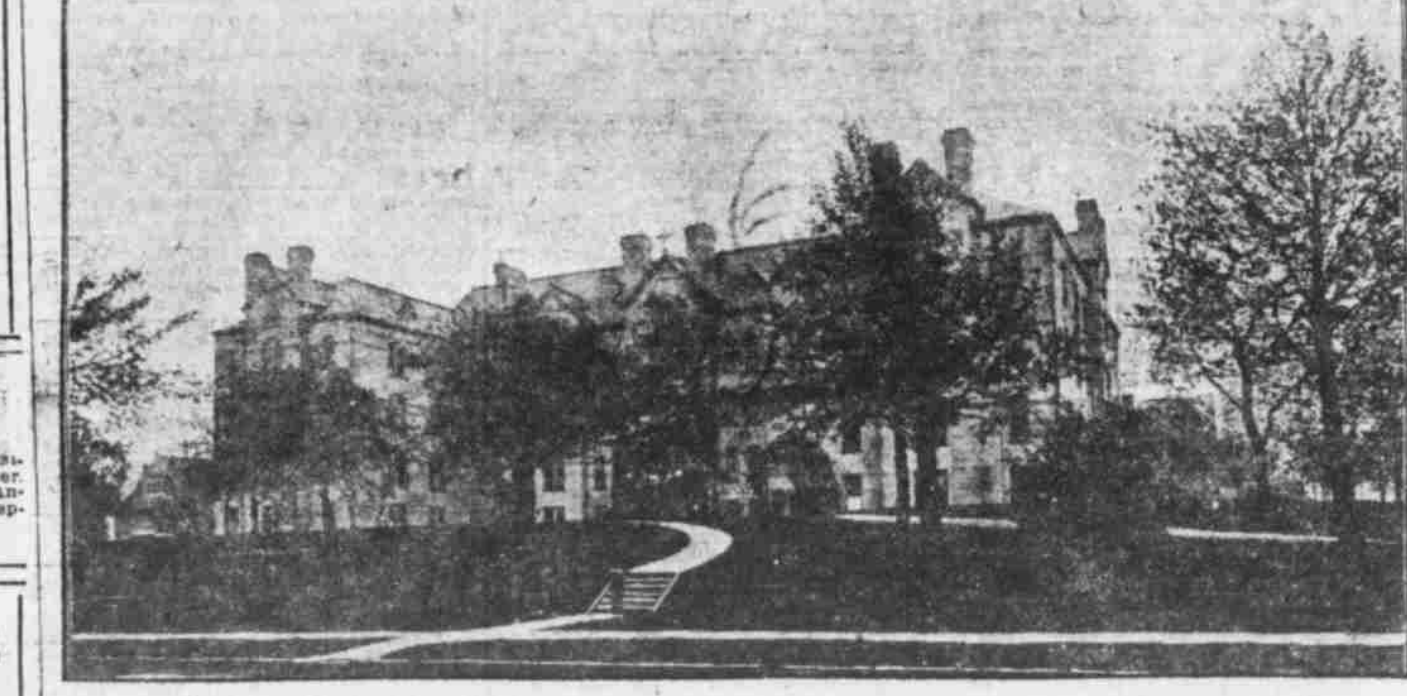
