CHICAGO GRAIN AND PROVISIONS

Features of the Trading and Closing Prices on Board of Trade.

CHICAGO, Aug. 22.—The beginning of the movement of the new crop of wheat on a large scale in the northwest-had a weakening effect today on the local market, prices at the close being off 14974c, compared with yesterday's final quotations. Corn and oats closed steady, but provisions were weak

with yesterday's final quotations. Corn and oats clored steady, but provisions were weak.

The situation in the northwist as related to the early movement of the new crop was the dominant factor in the wheat market. Arrivals of new wheat today at Minneapolis were eighty-five cars, against fifty-five cars yesterday and twenty-seven the previous day. It was expected also that Monday's arrivals would be much larger. The materializing last night of predicted frosts in many localities of the spriog wheat country, had apparently almost no effect and only caused mild firmness at the start, which effect the weakness of foreign markets. Soon after the opening prices slumped nearly to in all deliveries following a break at Minneapolis, september declining from 33%c to 92%c and December from 93%c to 96. On the decline the market received fair support from leading elevator interests, which steaded prices, but the lack of any export demand and the slewness of trade in cash wheat precluded any material rally. Additional selling prossure developed late in the day, owing to a break of 12c in the price of No. I northern wheat at Minneapolis, but offerings were not liberal. For September the low point of the day was reached at 32%c, and for December at 28%c. The market closed easy, with September at 30c. Final figures on December were 95. Clearances of wheat and flour were equal to 45,000 bushels. Primary receipts were 75,600 bushels. Compared with 718,000 bushels on the corresponding day one year ago. Minneapolls, Duluth and Chicago reported
