

GRAIN AND PRODUCE MARKET

Values Are Heavy and Drag Owing to Lack of Trade.

GENERAL SITUATION UNCHANGED

Expected Heavy Movement in the Northwest is the Predominant Feature for the Time Being.

OMAHA, August 22, 1908. Values on the grain market were heavy and dragged lower owing to a lack of trade, which was dull, as usual, on Saturday.

The general situation has not changed and the expected heavy movement in the northwest is the predominant feature for the time being. With a large increase in stocks prices should receive some setback.

Wheat was heavy and sold lower on lower cables and expected heavy shipments from the northwest.

Heavy selling and increased receipts told strongly at the close and values closed lower.

September wheat opened at 95c and closed at 94c.

Corn was dull and quiet, with light trading and very little interest manifested.

Cash sales were reported a trifle under yesterday, owing to the increased shipments.

September corn opened at 73c and closed at 72c.

CHICAGO GRAIN AND PROVISIONS

Features of the Trading and Closing Prices on Board of Trade.

CHICAGO, Aug. 22.—The beginning of the movement of the new crop of wheat on a large scale in the northwest had a weakening effect today on the market, prices at the close being off 1/8c, compared with yesterday's final quotations.

The situation in the northwest as related to the early beginning of the new crop was the dominant factor in the wheat market.

Arrivals of new wheat today at Minneapolis were eighty-five cars, against fifty-five cars yesterday and twenty-seven the previous day.

It was expected also that Monday's arrivals would be much larger.

The materializing last night of predicted frosts in many localities of the spring wheat country had apparently almost no effect and only caused mild frosts at the start, which effect the weakness of foreign markets.

September receipts were 71,000 bushels, compared with 73,000 bushels the corresponding day one year ago.

Minneapolis, Duluth and Chicago reported receipts of 200 cars against 247 cars last week and 23 cars one year ago.

The weakness of wheat included considerable selling of corn, but the market held fairly steady, owing to the low temperature which prevailed last night over the corn belt.

The close was steady, with prices 1/4c higher to 1/2c lower, September closed at 72c and December at 65c.

Local receipts were 18 cars, with 4 cars of contract grade.

There was very little trade in the oats market and prices held comparatively steady.

At the close prices were a shade lower to 1/2c higher, with September at 49c and December at 48c.

Local receipts were 12 cars.

Provisions were weak all day because of profit-taking sales in the market, which October deliveries.

Pork showed the greatest losses, the declines in that being from 1/2c to 1/4c, with the high point in the day.

The close was weak at almost the bottom, September pork closed at 14 1/2c and December at 14c.

Estimated receipts for Monday are: Wheat, 87 cars; corn, 331 cars; oats, 167 cars; hogs, 24,000; sheep, 10,000.

Freezing weather, with heavy frosts, is reported in the northern portion of North Dakota, and the cooler weather extends south over Nebraska and northern Iowa.

The high pressure will move down over the valley today, causing cooler in this vicinity tonight, followed by rising temperature Sunday, with fair tonight and Sunday.
