ROLLING STOCK IN BAD ORDER Canadian Pacific in Trouble Through Lack of Shoppers to Attend to Work.

WINNIPEG, Man., Aug. 21.—That the Canadian Pacific railway rolling stock is getting in bad condition owing to the absence of mechanics in the shops, was considered evident today when it was announced that three freight trains were derailed on the Lethbridge, Alberta branch yesterday. Much rolling stock was grounded, it is reported that the engines between Swift Current and Calgary have been put out of business since the strike began.

STRIKE RIOT IN TACOMA Italian Laborers Attempt to Drive Away Hindus Who Took Places They Vacated.

TACOMA, Wash., Aug. 21.—Maddened by the sight of forty Hindu strikers filling their places in the Northern Pacific railroad yards, about fifty Italian laborers, armed with stones, clubs and other weapons, twice today charged the Hindus to a pitched battle, but were repulsed by the latter with bullets. One Hindu is in the hospital with a bruised face, and the foreman of the truck gang has a lump on his forehead, from a rock thrown by the Italians. Other than these there were no casualties.
