RULING ON WATER RIGHTS People in States Where Streams Rise Cannot Take All the Water.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 24.-That the fedral government has the right and will interfere in the interest of a "fair deal" in the matter of the appropriation of the waters of interstate streams for irrigation purposes is the position taken by Secretary Garfield in connection with a number of Ames, Lee Hays of Hamiln, Ryburn of irrigation projects on the headwaters of the Rio Grande river, which stream rises in Colorado and flows through New Mexico. The projects which are responsible for the secretary's action are located in San Luis valley, a large tract of intermountain arable land in southern Colorado, and his opinion is the result of a personal inspection.

"I told the people interested," he said, that all their applications for reservoir sites would be favorably considered whenever I should be convinced that they did not fall outside the regulations of the de- an ictions were held up for a time on account of our treaty obligations to Mexico, which also are involved in the Rio Grande problem; but I showed them that having arrived at a decision as to the policy to be followed towards Mexico, there would no onger be any delay. I told them, however, hat not only the interests of Mexico, but also those of New Mexico must be protected. I stiempted to make it clear that prior rights in that territory must be considered just as they would be if they had been acquired in Colorado, and I am pleased to say there is no longer a general disposition to claim all the water of the stream for the people of Colorado simply

because the river heads in that state. "I also took pains to have them understand another rule of the department and that is that while the department will recognize priority of water rights it will do so only to the extent that such rights have been beneficially used, and this statement had the effect of assuring them that no rights in New Mexico which had been acquired for mere speculative purposes would be permitted to cut out any legitimate applications made by Colorado people. I told them also that I should not approvapplications made in Colorado in the interest of speculation only. In short, I tried to make them understand that the department would do all it could to encourage the settlement and the reclamation of the arid country, but that whatever it did must be done in a boni fide manner. I therefore assured them that all applications which did not interfere with acquired rights in New Mexico and with our treaty agreement to supply Mexico with water for
