NOVEL CONDITIONS FOR DERBY

READVILLE. Mass., Aug. 25.—Early conditions for the great American Trotting Derby, \$50,000, were ideal today and thousands of speciators thronged the Readville track to see the most novel harness race ever trotted in this country. The entry list of thirty-eight horses was too large to start off in one grand dash, so the bunch was split up and two preliminary heats arranged, with the first eight horses in each qualifying for the final. bunch was split up and two preliminary heats arranged, with the first eight horses in each qualifying for the final.

The cenditions of the race were unique in the history of the American turf. The contest provided for a handicap dash race, open to all trotters with marks of 2:15 or batter, the slowest horse being placed one-fourth of a mile behind the wire and the other handicapped to the rear, according to their past performances. The purse of \$60,000 was split up, \$30,000 going to the winner. \$10,000 to the second horse, \$5,000 to the third, \$2,500 to the fourth, \$1,500 to the fifth and \$1,000 to the sixth. The two scratch horses, or those set farthest back in the field in the two heats, were so noma Girl and Sweet Marie.

The conditions for the start of the race were entirely unusual, the horses all being placed at a fixed position and required to remain there, practically at a standstill, until the field was sent away. At each mark was placed a judge, who was in direct communication by means of a wire and push button, with the principal starter in the middle of the track, and it was arranged that as soon as each judge found his horse on the mark and ready to start he should push the button. When the principal starter found that all the signals had been dropped, arrangements called for his ringing the bell for the start. There




