F. H. Gaines, of the Omaha Country Club, is the champion amateur golfer of the state of Nebraska. In the final of the state tourney finished Saturday at the Country club he won from W. J. Foye, also of the Country club, by a score of thirty-six holes, four up and three to play. Mr. Foye is the club champion, and his defeat was in reality somewhat of a surprise, although it cannot be much attributed to a reversal of form. Mr. Gaines plays a hard fighting game, and although his form is not as good as that of Mr. Foye his results are worthy of a champion. At the end of the first eighteen played in the morning they were even, but in the second round Mr. Gaines took two on the outside nine and two more on the inside, winning the match by having twenty four strokes up to squares and the fifteen when he was four up, and the other clubs and from out-of-town are enthusiastic of their prizes of the manner in which the tourney has been managed and the courtesies which have been afforded. For the management, Secretary F. G. Koel is most to be thanked, and W. J. Foye, President Rahm and others were instrumental in arranging everything for the visitors' convenience. Mr. Koel posted a new clubhouse today, and on one of his men was put out of one event he found himself entered in another and was able to keep on playing for prizes all the time. Next year's tourney will be held at the Field club.

MORNING ROUND.
No. 1—Gaines beat the bunker on second and Foye took the hole. Score, 5 and 5.
No. 2—Both men made good drives within a few feet of the fence on the right of the green. Approaches were about even and the hole was odded, score, 5 and 4.
No. 3—Both drives were good for 30 yards and fell within ten feet of each other. The driving all through the first nine holes was very even. The hole was halved, 5 and 5.
No. 4—Foye drove out of bounds and lost his distance coming out with Gaines on his second. Gaines almost holed his approach, but Foye holed a twenty-foot put. Gaines won the hole and made the score all even. Score, 5 and 5.
No. 5—On his second drive both drives went just short of the water hazard. Here Foye had his worst luck and dubbed twice in succession into the ditch. After the second he gave the hole to Gaines, who took it in 6. Approximate score, 5 and 7.

CHICAGO, Aug. 29.—The New York team lost the second game of the series today to Chicago by the score of 2 to 1. Brown and Mathewson, two of the leading pitchers of the country, were opposed to each other in the combat. Neither team made an error during the exciting contest.

For three innings the world's champions could not touch Mathewson, but in the fourth inning they got to him for six hits that netted three runs and won the game. In this inning Hoffman hit into the left field crowd for two bases. Sheekard sacrificed, Chance chopped a bouncer over Deylin's head, scoring Hoffman. Evers singled into the crowd back of first. 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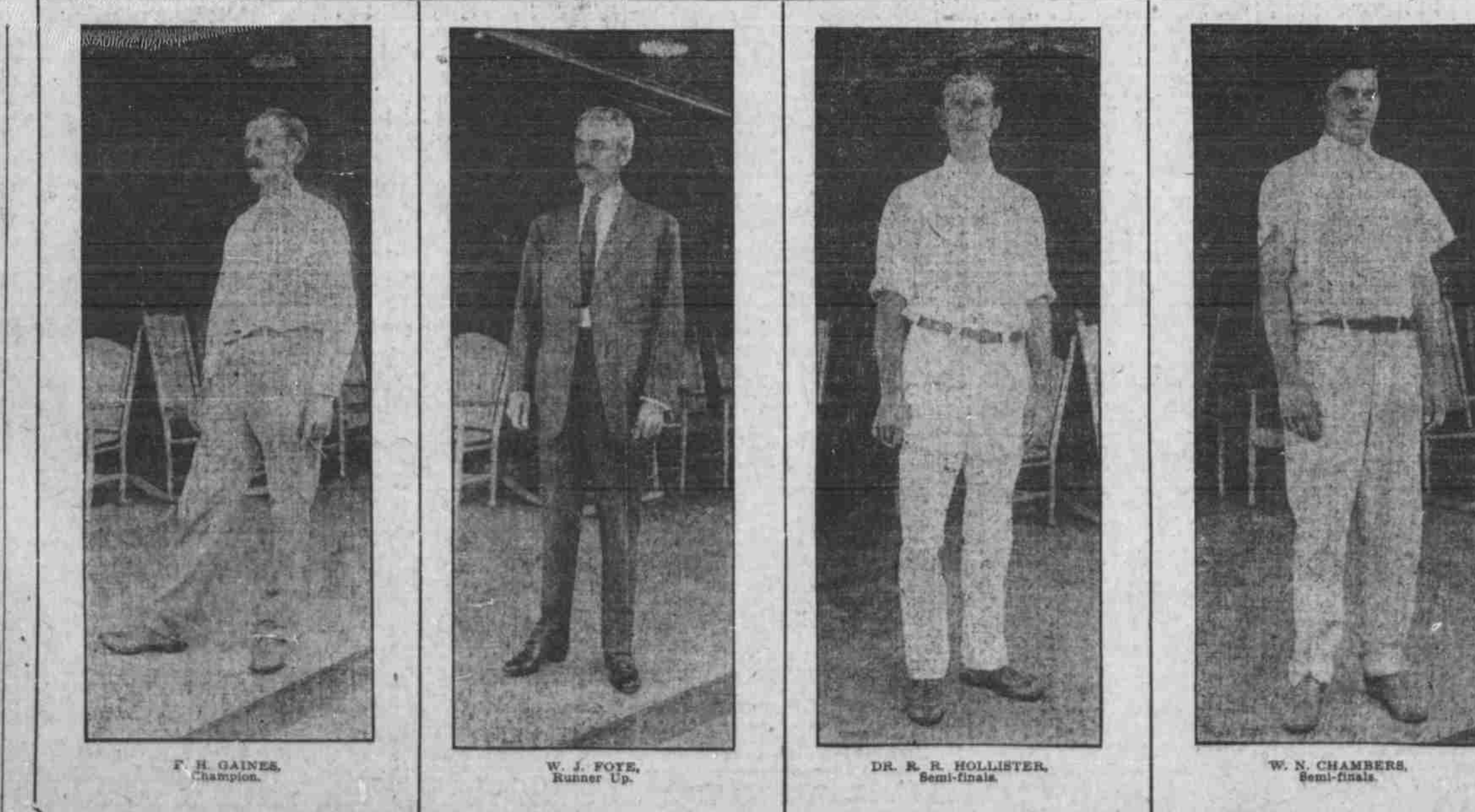

OMAHA BEATS DUCKY THRICE

Champs Win Double-Header with Terrific Week-End Swatfest.

Austin Makes His Second Home Run of the Series Off Ducky's Vaudered Rube from the Brush.

It's a sad, sad tale for Ducky (and a long way to the pennant).
Omaha took a double-header from Sioux City yesterday (winning three out of four games at Vinton street park in the last three days) in one of the most sensational and hair-raising finishes ever seen on the local diamond. It was a vindication of that "lucky seventh inning" and another argument against Furchner being even a near-great pitcher.

The first game was an easy victory for the Champs, with Pat Ragan opposing Starr in the box. The last game was won by Sioux City. It seemed, with McKay and Rhodes the contending slammers. Of a sudden Mr. McKay gets a little shaky in the seventh, three hits in succession being made off him, and then Ducky trots out that superb phenom of his, Furchner, who looks more like a good bay pitcher than a ball pitcher. Furchner came into the storm at its vortex and the floodtide was turned full-head on him. He was pounded, mauled and humiliated, and when the inning was over Omaha had five runs and six hits for the round, having the game clinched.

Austin's Second Home Run.

Mr. James D. Austin, who slathered this Furchner Thursday for a home run when two men were on bases, patted the ball into deep center, the precise location of his other one, and made a circuit of the bases with one man ahead of him yesterday in that terrible seventh. Austin sent the ball with such vicious speed that when Ducky Holmes steamed up to it, head-on, it sent him whirling head over heels and sped on a mad course for the fence. Two home runs for Austin in three days without knocking the ball over the lot. His speed was something terrific.

The victory of the second game was lucky for Rhodes, for he had been a bit untidy. King was the loud noise at the bat in that span, so far as number of hits went. He got four in five times up.
