PRIMARY TEST OVER HUGHES

Chairman Woodruff Consents to This Plan of Action.

NEW YORK, Sept. 4.—Timothy L. Woodruff, chairman of the New York state republican committee, announced this afternoon that he had advised Jacob Brenner, chairman of the Kings county republican committee to make a test of the sentiment

in Brooklyn for the renomination of Governor Hughes in several of the assembly districts at the primaries next Tuesday. Herbert Parsons, chairman of the New York county committee, last night announced a similar test of the Hughes sentiment in New York county at the primaries on Tuesday, when enrolled voters will be handed two ballots, on one of which will be printed the name of Governor Hughes in large type.

General Stewart L. Woodruff, who nominated Governor Hughes for the presidency at Chicago, called on Mr. Woodruff today and told the chairman that unless Governor Hughes was renominated that New York state would be lost to the republicans. Mr. Woodruff said that President Roosevelt voiced this sentiment exactly when he declared that the renomination of Governor

Hughes was a necessity. ALBANY, N. Y., Sept. 4.—Former Governor Frank B. Black, in a letter to State Superintendent of Elections C. W. Collins, made public today by Mr. Collins, expressed the opinion that Governor Hughes should be renominated by the republican party.

QUARREL RESULTS IN DEATH

Cheyenne County Farmers Fight Over Boundary and H. Perlick is Killed by George Hayward.

BRIDGEPORT, Neb., Sept. 4.—(Special.)—A quarrel that resulted in murder occurred last Saturday morning northwest of Bayard, George Boyer, who is well known throughout this part of the country, was setting a post on the section line, between his place and that of H. Perlick, when the latter appeared and demanded that the post be set back several feet, alleging that it was not on the correct line. Hot words followed, and in the quarrel Boyer struck Perlick on the head with the tamping stake he had been using. The unfortunate man taken to Scott's bluff for surgical treatment. He died Monday from blood-clot on the brain.

As the fight occurred in this county, Boyer was taken to Sidney for a preliminary hearing and was bound over to the grand jury. The deceased was about 60 years of age and leaves a widow and two small children in destitute circumstances. It is said the defense will be self-defense.

CLUE TO A MYSTERIOUS MURDER

Sheriff at Fremont Has Been Working on Case Three Years.

FREMONT, Neb., Sept. 4.—(Special.)—The arrest of a man by the name of Strathman in Chicago yesterday by Sheriff Bauman, on the charge of being implicated in the murder of Marcellus Faulkner on the Booth farm, just across the river from this across the river from this city, on December 21, 1905, is expected will solve one of the most mysterious murders ever committed in this vicinity. Public interest in the affair had nearly died out when about a year ago the sheriff got hold of a clue, which he followed up, with the result of the arrest he made yesterday. It was in the shape of a letter in which the writer intimated that she had been informed by John Grabowski, who was killed in a runaway accident here two years ago, that Strathman, who is a nephew by marriage of Grabowski, knew something about the case. The sheriff followed up this clue and learned that Strathman and Grabowski were in this vicinity when the crime occurred. Later, through Strathman's mother-in-law, he located the former in Chicago. He went there Wednesday and yesterday wired here that he would be here on the night train with Strathman and wife. Strathman at one time lived here. He was not regarded as criminally inclined, but rather as generally worthless. His mother-in-law, Mrs. Rudolf, lived here at the same time and appeared to be an honest, hard working woman, supporting herself and her aged mother by taking in washing.

It is a serious question whether Faulkner was killed in Dodge or Saunders county. His body was found just over the edge of the bluffs above the river by some boys while out hunting. He had evidently been hit over the head by some blunt instrument. His pockets had been rifled, and there was nothing to show his identity. There were marks on the ground indicating that the body had been carried or dragged some distance, and where buggy tracks ended a couple of stubs of tickets to the Creighton Orphanum of a few days before. It was first identified as the body of Thad Browning. The latter's brother-in-law, however, said it was not Browning, and a short time later Browning himself came here from his home in Iowa, and positively identified the body as his, were somewhat surprised. Several months after, by means of pictures, it was positively identified as Marcellus Faulkner of Greensboro, N. C., who had been discharged from the naval service in December, 1905, and had started for home by way of Santa Fe, N. M., and Denver with a good-sized bunch of money on his person. The family of Faulkner in North Carolina and the sheriff have, it is said, pretty conclusive evidence that Faulkner never got any further east on his trip home than Omaha. At the time of the murder substantial rewards were offered for the arrest of the murderer by the state, Saunders county and residents of Cedar Bluffs.

COL. GREENE'S CAR ATTACHED

Copper Magnate's Trip Delayed by Legal Proceedings as Result of Law suit.

SAN FRANCISCO, Sept. 4.—The private car belonging to Colonel W. C. Greene, the Cananea copper magnate, who arrived here last night, has been attached to the car of the Greens family to the south is delayed. The seizure was made on an attachment filed out of the suit filed against Colonel Greene a few days ago by Dr. E. B. Perrin for the recovery of \$12,000 alleged to be due the plaintiff, the purchase price of certain Arizona lands sold to Colonel Greene. Dr. Galbraith, Colonel Greene's secretary, says that the seizure of the car is merely the result of a misunderstanding.

DEATH RECORD

Oliver Dalrymple. ST. PAUL, Minn., Sept. 4.—Word was received here last night that Oliver Dalrymple, who was known as the "Bonanza wheat farmer," of North Dakota, died at his ranch home at Cassiday, N. D. The cause of death was given as heart disease, superinduced by old age. The Dalrymple farm consisted of seventeen sections, embracing 10,880 acres.

Emanuel Mandel.

CHICAGO, Sept. 4.—Emanuel Mandel, first vice president of Mandel Bros. and one of Chicago's most successful merchants, died last night at his home in Switzerland, according to a dispatch received here today. Death was due to a stroke of paralysis.

Frank P. Sargent.

WASHINGTON, Sept. 4.—Frank P. Sargent, commissioner of immigration, Department of Commerce and Labor, died in this city today of stomach trouble.

INDUSTRIES ARE PICKING UP

Increased Activity Shown in Statistics for July.

GRAIN AND LIVE STOCK MOVING

Over Seventy Per Cent of Car Associations Show Gains Over the Preceding Months in Transportation.

WASHINGTON, Sept. 4.—Notably increased activities in a number of lines of industry in the United States are shown in the July report of the bureau of statistics, of the Department of Commerce and Labor. There is a considerably heavier live stock movement reported for the seventh month ending with July than for the corresponding period of either of the two immediately preceding years. Grain receipts for July increased over the preceding month and also over July of last year. Lumber and coal movements, as well as the production of iron continue to show marked advances over the preceding months of the year, although the total is still below the heavy figures of July, 1907.

More than 70 per cent of the reporting car associations show gains over the preceding months of the current year. Live-stock receipts at seven interior primary markets aggregated 2,574,393 head.

With returns from forty-five leading cities, the building operations for July showed improvement, a small gain over the remarkably large business of July of last year being reported. Trunk line grain shipments of 11,626,000 bushels for July largely exceed those for July of last year, the gain also showing for the thirty-one weeks ending with July. The eastbound trunk line movement of provisions during the five weeks ending with July, 97,027 tons, while in excess of a like period in June, fell below the figures for the corresponding period of 1907. Packing house products, receipts of southern pine at New York, pig iron and other productions showed gains over the preceding months. Coal and coke traffic over seven eastern systems carrying roads during July, 1908, aggregated 9,261,990 tons, far in excess of the preceding month's total, though still nearly 3,000,000 tons below the like shipments for July, 1907. The increase over the June figures is largely due to the 1,000,000 ton increase in shipments of bituminous coal.

PITTSBURG, Pa., Sept. 4.—A long continued drouth in western Pennsylvania and West Virginia is gradually reaching serious proportions and the lack of rain is causing the suspension of many industries. At Greensburg, Pa., several plants of the H. C. Frick Coke company have been compelled to shut down. Farmers are hauling water for miles. Streams which have never before been known to go dry are so shallow that only here and there a stagnant pool is found. This water is scooped up, boiled and used for domestic purposes.
