The signal corps has several old balloons which will be used for practice work of this character. The tests will probably be held at the new aeropark at Fort Omaha Tests of this character in Germany have shown that a balloon can be hit at a height of two and one-half miles. On July 20, at Magdeburg, a captive balloon at this altitude was struck thirty times, but did not collapse.

Mr. Wright, in speaking of the possibility of hitting his aeroplane while in flight, said:

"Officers of the German army have told me that an aeroplane could not be fired at with any degree of accuracy when 1,000 feet in the air. With my present machine it is possible to go a mile high and not experience any adverse effects from the dif ference in the air at that altitude." ator of the machine, as a few bullet through the structure of the aeroplan would not affect its flight.
