A JOINT RESOLUTION to propose an Amendment to Section 9, Article 8, of the Constitution of the State of Nebruska.

Be it Essoived and Enacted by the Legislature of the State of Mebraska:

Section 1. (Amendment.) That at the general election for state and legislative officers to be held on the Tuesday succeeding the first Monday in November, 1908, the following provision be proposed and submitted to the electors of the State as an amendment to Section 9, Article 8, of the Constitution of the State of Nebraska:

Section 9. (Educational Funds, Investment.) All funds beausging to the state for educational purposes, the interest and income whereof only are to be used, shall be deemed trust funds held by the state, and the state shall supply all losses thereof that may in any manner accrue, so that the same shall remain forever inviolate and undiminished; and shall not be invested or loaned except on United States or state securities, or registered school district bands. and undiminished, and shall not be invested or loaned except on United States or state securities, or registered school district bonds of this state, and such other securities as the legislature may from time to time direct. And such funds, with the interest and income thereof, are hereby solemnly piedged for the purpose for which they are granted and set apart, and shall not be transferred to any other fund for other uses.
