MAIL CLERKS ASK MORE PAY

Present Their Case to Business Men at Rome Hotel Banquet. NATIONAL PRESIDENT THERE

The American railway mail clerk makes one error out of every 15,000 pieces of mail handled, he gets on an average of \$1,300 a year, pays his own expenses while on the road, must know on an average of 10,000 stations, and for the last fifteen years has passed an examination of 90 per cent on this knowledge; he must put in at least four years before he can hope to become proficient in his work; he undergoes a hazard of life, which few men face, one out of eighteen clerks being killed or injured every year.

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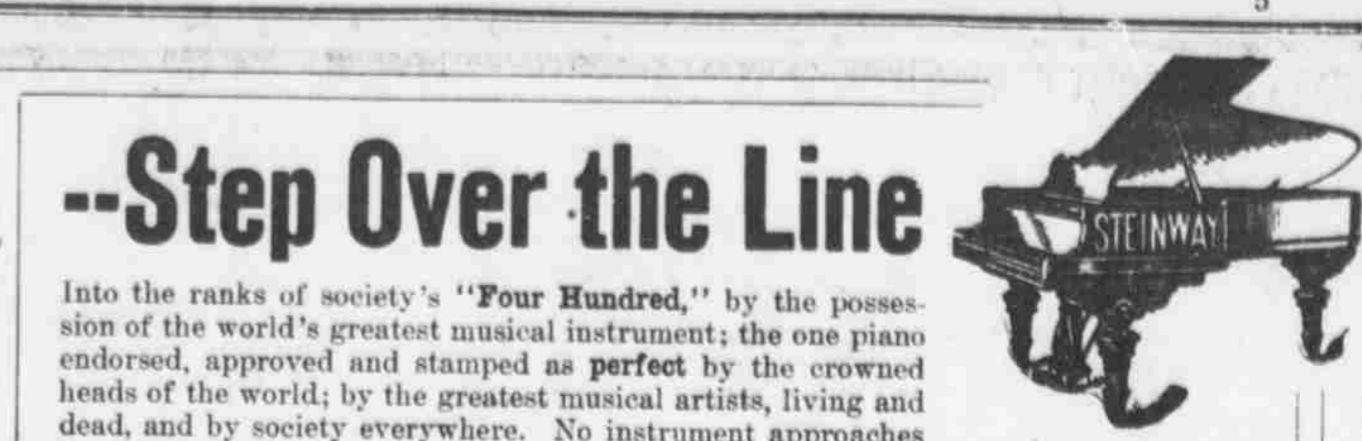
