> WYMORE TO GET GOOD WATER Special Meeting of City Council Con-

siders Proposition. WYMORE, Neb., Sept. 20 .- (Special.) -At a special meeting of the city council last night the Markle-Huston company made a proposition, which, if proved to be practical, will result in a supply of good water for Wymore. The company owns a big sand pit east of the Blue river. Fifteen or twenty years ago an expert hired by the city located good water there, but his suggestions were never acted on. The Markle-Huston company has been experimenting and believes there is an inexhaustible supply of water there. The water is the finest that can be obtained in this part of the country. The theory is that the Big Blue river has an underground flow running through the vein of sand and gravel, which in its passage is filtered. The Markle-Huston company proposes to sell the water to the city for 5 cents per thousand gallons as a maximum price, or to buy the water plant and furnish the city fire protection and sell water to consumers. The intake pipe of the plant is but about 300 yards from the sand pit. The city owns a park on the east side of the river, the land adjoining the company's land and going to within 100 feet of the place where it was cure all forms of kidney and bladder dis- proposed to sink a well. Now it is proposed that the city build another test well in the park near the sand pit, before taking up the Markie-Huston proposition. arise. Cholera made its apprairance in Russia about this time last year, but it was cotfined to the southern and southeastern provinces and did not get to the capital. The cold weather during the latter part of October and the earlier weeks of November checked its spread and by the first of December it had practically disappeared. This year, however, it has had what may be termed a flying start and it is aweeping over the city in a manner to bring alarm to all classes. It is believed now that the waters of the Neva are contam inated. Recently steamers have been supplying boiled water to the river barger. and a large force of physicians has been drafted to make a thorough canvass of the quarter where the disease is supposed to have originated and where it received its strongest impetus.

MORE CASES REPORTED IN MANILA Authorities Confident, However, of Controlling Cholera,

Manila, Sept. 21.-Fifty-eight new cases of cholera and nineteen deaths are reported for the twenty-four hours ending at 8 o'clock this (Monday) morning. The infected areas in the city and suburbs are spreading somewhat but the health authe gittes are still confident that they will be able to speedily gain control of the situation.

Governor General Smith has summoned special meeting of the members of the Philippine commission, to discuss the plague situation and to lay plans for an extension of the campaign now being waged against the disease. Federal troops are at present guarding
