For the Festival of King Ak-Sar-Ben Begins at Noon.

WILL BE BEST OF ALL King's Highways for Thousands on the Bent.

COUNTY FAIR STRONG CARD Reduced Rates on Railroads Will Bring Enormous Numbers.

CHEAP FARES TO ALL PARTS Chief of Police Assures Omaha's Visitors the Best Possible Protection During the Entire Festivities.

King's Highway, the amusement grounds of Ak-Sar-Ben, opens at noon Wednesday.

Railroads having granted reduced rates, a larger crowd than ever is expected this fall.

COME TO HEAR TAFT SPEAK

Republican Clubs Convention Held in Cincinnati Today. MANY DELEGATIONS ATTEND

Special Train is Made Up on Which Presidential Candidate Will Take His Sixteen Days' Speaking Trip. CINCINNATI, O., Sept. 22.—When I get into the White House, assuming I am to be put there, no plea in favor of a negro will have any comparison because he is a negro rather than a white man.

There was hardly a sentence which Judge Taft uttered that did not receive warm applause by his hearers, who were seated in the upper banquet hall of the Sinton hotel.

Real Representatives of Race. Judge Taft remarked that in a letter he had had from Booker T. Washington he had been told that when he received Dr. Morris' delegation he would be meeting real representatives of the race.

Mr. Taft invited his hearers that the one way to abolish race prejudice was by the force of their own example and citizenship on the part of the negro.

DECLARES HE WILL NOT PERMIT AN ACCREDITED REPRESENTATIVE OF DEMOCRATIC ORGANIZATION TO BE ABUSED. DETROIT, Mich., Sept. 22.—The remarkable spectacle of a presidential candidate rebuking the chief executive of the nation for making statements deemed to be unjustified was witnessed today, when William J. Bryan in a letter to President Roosevelt, defended Governor Haskell of Oklahoma, treasurer of the democratic national committee, against the charge that he had unlawful connections with the Standard Oil company.

Mr. Bryan serves notice on the president that as the candidate of the democratic party, he will make no compromise with the member of the republican organization to misrepresent the democratic party in the present campaign.
