Shortly after the opening the demand of several commission houses raised prices to a point about \$10 above the previous close. The market, however, was unable to withstand the bear influence and soon weakened again. Declines at Minneapolis and Winnipeg were partly responsible for the renewed weakness. The lower prices at Minneapolis were due largely to an increase of \$50,000 bushels in stocks there during the last two days, while the decline at Winnipeg was largely the result of predictions of a big increase in receipts of new wheat. During the last half the market was bearlsh, affected by rumors to the effect it, the visible supply statement would show a surprisingly liberal increase in the available stocks of wheat in the United States, and Canada. The official figures, which were made public a few minutes before the close, verified these rumors, inasmuch as the increase in stocks was estimated at \$2.23,000 bushels compared with exercise of 259,000 bushels the corresponding time a year ago. Export demand here and at northwestern markets was duil, but late reports from the seaboard claimed thirty-six boat loads had been taken for export. Additional rains in the winter wheat belt were another reason for the heaviness of the local market. The market closed at almost the bottom prices. Clearances of wheat and flour were equal to 1.87,000 bushels. Primary receipts were 2,416,000 bushels. Compared with 1.144,000 bushels the corresponding day a year ago. Minneapolis, Duluth and Chinago reported receipts of 2.044 cars, against 2.037 last week and 713 cars last year.
