ELEMENTS AGAINST RALLY

Severe Rain Keeps Many Away from the Hawley Meeting.

DELIVERS A STRONG ADDRESS

Does Not Assail Candidates, but Analyzes the Democratic Contention in a Most Convincing Manner.

The elements were against the republicans Monday and the heavy rain in the earlier part of the evening was responsible for Congressman W. C. During the course of his speech Mr. Hawley used a great number of illustrations to emphasize his points and his address throughout was thoroughly interesting.

WYOMORE, Neb., Oct. 20.—(Special Telegram.)—Governor George L. Sheldon was greeted by a large and enthusiastic crowd at opera house yesterday afternoon in spite of the rain. He was suffering from a bad cold and could not make a long speech. He made a very favorable impression on Wyomore and aroused much enthusiasm among citizens of all political faiths. In his talk he told of the work of the republican party in Nebraska, especially in the last two years. He spoke of the reforms and touched other subjects briefly. He praised A. C. Shallenberger as a citizen, but picked his statements to pieces and denied them. He issued a challenge to the democratic nominee for governor to prove the charges that the present administration has been extravagant in expending state money. He also stated that Shallenberger's statement that the present administration is not entitled to credit for reducing the state debt on account of the special 1 mill levy for the purpose is untrue. He said that the special levy in the last two years has raised \$50,000 and that the other \$25,000 was secured by careful administration and close economy. He made a detailed explanation of why land values or assessments had been raised, giving as his reason for doing so that it is expected there would be circulators, probably unincorporated or fictitious, and that he wanted Wyomores to know the truth. WRIGHT DISCUSSES BRYAN

Secretary of War Severely Condemns Nebraskan's Ideas. TWO PLATFORMS ARE COMPARED. Democratic Tariff Plank Intended to Please Free Traders and Protectionists Alike—Business Interests in Danger.

NEW YORK, Oct. 20.—(Special Telegram.)—Secretary of War William J. Bryan been severely arraigned during the present campaign as he was here last night by General Luke E. Wright, secretary of war, who addressed a large mass meeting at Terrace Garden. General Wright, who was introduced as "A democrat having the honor of holding a cabinet position under a republican administration," was greeted with enthusiastic cheering when he appeared on the platform.
