Marcus Whitehead, a 17-year-old boy who bought a set of Balgac, was directed to go before the grand fury now in session. Whitehead works in the Exchange building at South Omaha. Some time ago he bought a twelve-volume set of Balzac from W. A. Hixenbaugh & Co., subscription agents, on the installment plan. In reality, according to the testimony in juvenile court. he bought only ten volumes. Two other volumes of short stories, said to be so broad in their realism that they are unsulable, were thrown in as an inducement to buy the ten

Whitehead tried to read the books, but he was unable to fathom the literaryisms of the famous French realist and he sold some of the books to a friend. Hixenbaugh had him arrested and placed in jail Friday, and Monday morning he was taken before Judge Estelle, as he was of juvenile court age. After hearing both sides of the story Judge Estelle sent the boy out of the room and administered a scoring to Hixenbaugh, deciaring his offense in selling the books under the circumstances was worse than that of the boy who sold what did not belong

At the close of the judge's remarks the juvenile court workers applauded his severe arraignment of the book agent.
