Two Counties of Ireland Upset on Licensing Small Taverns.

LAW AND CLERGY IN THE TURMOIL

Army of Magistrates Vex Their Sanguine Legal Minds.

GRAPPLE IN VAIN WITH PROBLEM

Catholic and Presbyterian Protest the Renewal of License

POPULACE IS IN GREAT STEW

All This Civil, Political and Religious Hubbub is Created Over One Little Inn on Country Road.

DUBLIN, Nov. 14.—(Special.)—Not since the rebellion of 1798, when Henry Joy McCracken led the men of Down and Antrim against the English troops, has there been such excitement in these two counties as has been created during the last few weeks over the proposal to relicense the Goat Inn at Miltown, County Down.

The cause of all this bother was a modest looking little inn on the main road, just five miles from Belfast, and its geographical position had everything to do with its importance.

Letters were received by the magistrates protesting against the renewal of the license from the Catholic and Anglican bishops of Down and Connor and from the moderator of the Presbyterian general assembly.

Several collisions occurred between the Gaities and the anti-Gaities in the streets of Newtownards after the decision, and eventually the police, who had been strengthened by drafts from all parts of the county, cleared the town and drove the partisans out into the country.

A proposal is being made in certain unionist papers to reduce the representation of Ireland in the British Parliament, and it is based on the apparently specious ground that Ireland is very much over-represented in proportion to its population.

Another sign of the change which is coming over political feeling in the north is the announcement that the labor party has agreed to contest the next parliamentary elections in North and East Belfast.

The division have been strongholds of unionism and orangism, but they are largely working class, and the workmen of Ulster are getting tired of being used to pull the landlords' chestnuts out of the fire.

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TAFT MAKES REPLY

President-Elect Answers Questions Regarding Philippine Catholics. NO SPECIAL FAVORS GRANTED.

Are Being Sold to Tenants. Action Necessary to Prevent Second Uprising of Natives.

Problems Difficult to Solve. Union of Church and State Under Former Government Presented. New Issues, Which Were Fairly Met.

ST. PAUL, Minn., Nov. 14.—The Dispatch in its morning edition will print the following correspondence which passed between Rev. Magnus Larson, pastor of the Swedish Baptist church of this city, and Judge William H. Taft.

"Dear Sir: Pardon a few questions from a humble St. Paul preacher. I wish, however, first of all to state that I have been an admirer of President Roosevelt and have considered him in many respects an ideal president.

"The questions I wish to ask concern your work in the Philippine Islands, and your attitude towards the Catholic church. Was it on your recommendation that \$7,000,000 was paid to the Catholic church out of the United States treasury, and that the pope was consulted regarding this deal?

"In a speech in New York some time ago you made a plea for the Roman Catholic church in the Philippines, making the statement that the church was very poor. Is it not true that half the population, or 3,000,000 people, are not Roman Catholics?

"Have not thousands of dollars been paid to friars for libraries they have claimed to have burned? Is it your conviction and policy that Catholic dignitaries and the Catholic church should have greater consideration from a public official and official than from a chief executive of our nation than any other recognized religious body?

"The questions are asked in all sincerity with a view to get just and right in my political attitude. I have not one word to say against the Catholic church or any other denomination. I do content that the one shall not have any more favors than the other.

"This, as far as appears from the facts now made public, appears to be the attitude of Haas. He alludes constantly to the shame and disgrace he has experienced since Henry, several weeks ago, confronted him as he sat in the jury box before a crowded court room with a photograph of himself in his pocket.

"In a speech in New York I did not make a plea for the Roman Catholic church in the Philippines, except to say this: That the influence of all the churches in the Philippines was necessary for the uplifting of the people, and therefore, that every one would desire the prosperity of all the churches, and that as the Roman Catholic church had the largest following, everyone, Protestants or Catholics, would desire its prosperity.

"It is not true that half of the population of the Philippines are Catholics." (Continued on Second Page.)

CITY IS STIRRED BY CRIME

Attempt on Life of Prosecutor Heney Deliberate Act. PROOF HAAS PLANNED THE DEED.

Citizens in Mass Meeting Call Upon the Public to Protect the Cause of Justice—Victim May Recover. SAN FRANCISCO, Nov. 14.—Francis J. Haas, who was shot down in the court room yesterday while conducting the prosecution of Abraham Ruef, will recover from the effects of his injury unless the predictions of his physicians fail.

"The gravest danger appears to be from blood poisoning and today an effort will be made to locate the bullet and the exact course of the wound. Mr. Heney was shot in the right side of the head as he leaned forward over a table. The bullet entered half an inch in front of the right ear, ranged downward and lodged in the muscles on the left side of the neck.

Dr. J. L. Gray, who yesterday testified that in his opinion the cause of death of the adult female body found in the ruins was aplasia, resumed the witness stand today for completion of his cross-examination.

Money Matters Shown by Comptroller to Be in Good Condition. QUARTER MILLION BALANCE LEFT.

Outstanding Warrants Taken Up for Investment by Sinking Fund. AVAILABLE CASH IN ALL FUNDS.

In the General Fund Warrants \$32,800 and Road \$13,636. NO OBLIGATION WILL GO BEGGING.

Except for Small Amount of Cash on Hand Balance is in Depository Banks Instead of in Warrants.

With all of its outstanding warrants taken up for investment by the bond sinking fund, with a cash balance of \$56,977.17 in the hands of the county treasurer and large available balances in every fund, Douglas county is in a financial condition which is entirely satisfactory to those in charge of its money matters.

Balance on hand November 1, \$258,977.17. General fund, \$129,567.52. Road fund, \$13,636.36. Bond sinking fund, \$9,261.27. Sinking fund relief fund, \$19,929.89. Permanent fund, \$11,929.89.
