DECISION VITAL TO THE NATION

Knowledge of Rates Depends Efficacy of Regulation by Congress.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 23 .- Attorney General Boraparte filed today a petition for a writ of certiorari in the supreme court the United States urging that court to issue a writ of certiorari to the circuit court f appeals for the seventh circuit to review the judgment of that court reversing the rulings of Judge Landis in the case in hich the Standard Oil company was fined \$19,000,000 on the charge of violating the anti-trust law. The attorney general takes as separate and independent corporations. the position that the court of appeals was without jurisdiction when it reversed Judge Landis' decision.

Four reasons for the issuance of the writ are given, as follows:

"First-It is highly desirable in the pub-He interest to promote fustice in the future prosecution and final determination of this pacticular case, considered in and by itself. Second-It is indispensable for the instruction and advice of the government in the intelligent administration and enforcement of the laws involved.




